The Blessings of **God's Presence**

ave you recently or in the past ever carefully considered the blessings and joy of God's presence, or for that matter, what it really means to be in His presence?

Journey with me through Psalms 84 written by the sons of Korah. The first two verses express a deep yearning for God's presence and a celebration of being in the temple. "How lovely is your dwelling place, Lord Almighty! My soul yearns, even faints, for the courts of the Lord; my heart and my flesh cry out for the Living God." (NIV)


According to the Andrews Study Bible, the pilgrimage to the sanctuary in Jerusalem to appear before the Lord is in the background, similar to Psalms 27, 42, and 43. God has a rich variety of titles in this psalm. He is the Lord of hosts, the Lord, the Living God, King, God, God of Jacob, Sun and Shield (p. 738).

This experience of "the joy of being in the temple, in the presence of the Living God (the expression 'the Living God' is used only twice in the Psalter: here and in 42:2; see also Deuteronomy 5:26; Joshua 3:10; 1 Samuel 17:26)" is further expressed in verses 10-12. "Better is one day in your courts than a thousand elsewhere, I would rather be a doorkeeper in the house of my God than dwell in the tents of the wicked" (verse 10, NIV).

In my thinking, verse 10 sets out a most profound truth about the privilege and experience of God's presence. This verse challenges us to examine our feelings and experiences when entering into God's presence. Do we realize the magnitude of such privilege and such honor to be permitted to come into God's presence? Psalm 84:10 further reflects the attitude and gratitude of the psalmist to serve as a doorkeeper in the house of God. Do we have similar feelings and attitudes as the psalmist when entering the presence of God?

Hopefully, that should be the mindset we always bring to worship. Then it should also be evident in our outward behavior, our practices, our dress, and our conversations that we are constantly cultivating a deep abiding respect, love, and joy for the privilege of being able to come into the presence of the Living God through the grace of Jesus, our Lord and Savior!

Behind the Scenes of AUAM by Ednor A. P. Davison

et's face it, many people often take for granted what goes on behind the scenes of any program they attend or watch. It is a world behind the scenes that often goes unrecognized. One such program is Atlantic Union Adventist Media (AUAM) ministry. What do you really know about the ministry and the people behind the scenes?

AUAM is a media ministry of the Atlantic Union Conference that has been in existence for about nine years. AUAM is committed to spreading the gospel through television, the Internet, and new technology.

A Brief History

AUAM was established when, with the assistance of 3ABN, a generous donor, who has a deep interest in inner-city work, gave a major gift to the Atlantic Union to help in developing ways of reaching the masses in New York City and other cities for Christ. Donald *G*.

King, Atlantic Union Conference president, and the Atlantic Union Adventist Media Governing Board made the decision to purchase a production truck rather than utilizing a fixed facility, and have it customized with all the equipment necessary to video record, edit, and produce local programs.

Subsequently, the North American Division, which also shares a passion for inner-city evangelism, gave the additional funds needed to complete the customization of the production truck. In addition, individuals in the Greater New York and Northeastern conferences have given generous donations toward this project. The truck was dedicated on June 11, 2005, during services held at the Linden church in Laurelton, New York.

Places AUAM Has Been

The AUAM production truck has traveled from the Atlantic Union headquarters in Massachusetts, to Rhode Island,

to New York City, to upstate New York, and to Bermuda (without the truck). They have recorded hundreds of hours of programs around the Atlantic Union, including camp meetings, women's ministries conventions, a pastors and teachers convention, the joint camp meeting at the Nassau Coliseum, live church services, a Breath of Life revival with Carlton Byrd, speaker/ director of Breath of Life Ministries. and a Revelation of Hope Series with Ted Wilson, Seventh-day Adventist world church president, to name a few. College and University Campuses: An Overdue Challenge and Responsibility

f you heard that more than two million people, mostly young adults, with all types of needs, live in your proximity, what would you do? If it was further brought to your attention that they are going through some of the most crucial moments of their lives, and getting ready to make lifelong decisions, how would you and your church seek to make a difference in their circumstances?

These are not hypothetical questions, it is our reality in the Atlantic Union territory, where an estimated 2,228,683 higher education students go to school at the hundreds of public and private campuses. According to statistics provided by the Department of Education of each state and the Bermuda government, there are about: 1,259,017 in New York, 501,164 in Massachusetts, 195,084 in Connecticut, 85,277 in Rhode Island, 71,060 in Maine, 70,754 in New Hampshire, 44,957 in Vermont, and 1,370 at Bermuda College in Bermuda.

If we group these numbers together and compare it to the cities across our territory, the student population would be the second largest city in the Atlantic Union, second only to New York City, and larger than Boston, Hartford, Providence, Manchester, Portland, or Hamilton. There are more college and university students in the Atlantic Union territory than there are people in Maine (1,328,361), New Hampshire (1,316,470), Rhode Island (1,052,567), Vermont (625,741), and Bermuda (64,806).

Six out of the eight prestigious Ivy League schools, that are well known for their excellence, selectivity in admission, and social elitism are also in the Atlantic Union territory: Brown University (Providence, R.I.), Columbia University (New York, N.Y.), Cornell University (Ithaca, N.Y.), Dartmouth College (Hanover, N.H.), Harvard University (Cambridge, Mass.), and Yale University (New Haven, Conn.). These and other schools in our territory are the places where future leaders for our country and the world are equipped and shaped.

Several United States presidents and other world leaders were educated right in the Atlantic Union territory; John F. Kennedy, George H. W. Bush, Bill Clinton, George W. Bush, and Barack Obama, to name a few.

The point of all this is that we need to get serious about ministry on non-Adventist university and college campuses across the Atlantic Union territory. After all, which one of the cities or states mentioned above would you give up and totally pull the Adventist ministry and presence from? The truth is that we seem to have given up on those campuses and currently have very little Adventist ministry or organized presence in any of the schools in our territory. We have unintentionally, with very few exceptions, forsaken more than 2.2 million people who could benefit from our ministry and presence.

Together with our team of youth directors, union, and conference leadership we are working on the following recommendations:

- **1.** Place chaplains in the main centers of higher education across the Atlantic Union with the purpose of identifying Adventist students on the area campuses and planting Adventist Christian Fellowships, small groups, and churches on those campuses.
- **2.** Become intentional about the placing and equipping of pastors in churches and districts close to colleges and universities.

If we take this call seriously, the benefits will be:

- 1. Retention of our Adventist college and university students who go to non-Adventist schools (about 80 percent of our Adventist sons and daughters go to non-Adventist schools).
- **2.** Creation of a healthy evangelistic lifestyle among Adventist students in non-Adventist schools.
- 3. Reaching of the highly educated and potentially influential and wealthy upcoming generations. It is easier to reach them on their way up rather than trying to get them once they are on top of the world.

Sonia Dawes Named Teacher of the Year

n June 19, middle school teachers across the island of Bermuda gathered at the Gilbert Institute to celebrate the middle school teachers who were nominated by their students for the 2014 Teacher of the Year award. It was a relaxed atmosphere while the students and nominees, along with family, friends, and colleagues waited patiently for the big announcement.

The Learning Disabilities Association of Bermuda invited students from all middle schools to enter a creative piece outlining reasons why their teachers should be selected teacher of the year. There were many entries in the form of essays, poems, posters, and videos. As some of the students shared their creative pieces with the audience. it was clear that the judges did not have an easy time making the final selection. The video submitted by Xiaye Bradshaw earned her teacher, Sonia Dawes, the much coveted title of Teacher of the Year.

Dawes has been in the classroom for more than 30 years and has impacted many lives during her career. It was no great surprise to her former students and colleagues when they learned of her award. Her students describe her as loving, Christ-like, even-tempered, patient, encouraging, and consistent. Her colleagues see her as a friendly, consistent, creative, professional, and gifted teacher. Some often refer to her as a "master teacher," because of her consistency and compassion in teaching her students.

Evangelism Conference Inspires New Life

The Southern New England Conference Evangelism Department hosted an evangelism conference May 16-18, at Camp Winnekeag in Ashburnham, Massachusetts, entitled "Advancing the Kingdom: Developing Relationships" with the hope of creating a reawakening of the evangelism spirit across the conference.

The weekend event featured six presenters: Manny Cruz, Eric Flickinger, Scott Christiansen, Mark Gagnon, Warren Ruf, and Edgardo Herrera. They presented seminars covering such topics as youth evangelism, prayer in evangelistic settings, how one person can make a difference, the role of relationships as a means of

leading someone to Christ, discipleship, small groups, and the role of prophecy in the degeneracy of our planet.

programming, dress, reading a particular version of Bible (some prefer reading only the King James Version of the Bible in their churches), and application of Scripture. He emphasized that while we do not need to change the message, we need to alter the method if we want to retain the youth and young adults in the church, because the postmodern mind perceives and approaches things differently.

In his Sabbath message, Donald G. King, Atlantic Union president, charged the participants to engage in the spiritual warfare with all the spiritual arsenals at our disposal, utilizing Christ's method in finishing the work.
