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Witnesses for God

hroughout history, the Seventhday Adventist health message has been an entering wedge into the hearts and homes of many who would otherwise not have gone into any church facility. That has not stopped over the years. The Adventist health message has spread throughout the world. We operate advanced healthcare systems through AdventHealth, mainly in the East, and Adventist Health, mainly on the West Coast and in Hawaii. They are modern, state-of-the-art, cutting-edge healthcare services. Our hospitals, among them Loma Linda, are renowned for doing some groundbreaking operations.

At the same time, as a church, we continue to promote natural, healthy living through preventive medicine and natural remedies. Several of the six conferences in the Atlantic Union have ongoing medical missionary training. Adventist medical missionaries are trained and encouraged to apply natural remedies to prevent sicknesses and improve health in their communities. They educate church members and their communities on ways to improve health by practicing the eight natural laws of health.

Among the programs designed to promote the health message are Creation Life (formerly Creation Health) and NEWSTART. The acronym CREATION stands for Choice, Rest, Environment, Activity, Trust in God, Interpersonal Relationships, Outlook, and Nutrition. The NEWSTART Lifestyle Program is an acronym for Nutrition, Exercise, Water, Sunlight, Temperance, Air, Rest, and Trust.

COVID-19 has not stopped these two aspects of Adventist witnessing. The pandemic has instead provided more opportunities for many to share God's love in their communities by caring for patients on the one hand and showing how to boost the immune system naturally on the other hand. The immune system can be strengthened by implementing the natural health laws, thus enabling the body to fight COVID-19.

One of our church members in New York has made it her mission to reach out to anyone who tested positive for coronavirus in her community. She prepares natural remedies that may boost their immune system and shares ways to increase their Vitamin D level to help fight the deadly virus. In addition, God continues to use both our army of physicians and other medical professionals from the medical institutions, and our medical missionaries to create change in their communities.

Adventist health institutions have cared for countless COVID-19 patients. On December 18, 2020, the Adventist Church officially released a statement that encourages members to consider responsible immunization while recognizing that the decision is personal, and should be made in consultation with one's physician.

In John 10:10, 11, Jesus says, "I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full. I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep" (NIV). To have life "to the full" is to live an abundant life—a healthy life as God intends for His children, a life of peace, joy, and happiness. Seventh-day Adventists continue to promote this whole and abundant life, even in spite of the COVID-19 pandemic.

One of these days this pandemic will be over. But our need to be witnesses for God will remain, and health ministry will continue to be one of the proven witnessing tools at our disposal. Christ, our Good Shepherd, will continue to lead His people to share this message with those not in the fold.

Ministering to Others Brings Rich Blessings

s we enter summer, the global coronavirus pandemic continues to affect our lives, churches, economy, and community connections. The pandemic opened a variety of ways for church members to get involved in the community, from visiting prisons and transitional housing facilities to educate residents or detained individuals about the COVID-19 vaccine, to delivering food to individuals with limited access, to teaching children, youth, and seniors how to prepare healthy meals. Meeting our community's health

needs allows us to become involved in people's lives in invaluable and muchappreciated ways.

COVID-19 Education and Prevention

More than 169 million people worldwide have been infected by, and more than 3.5 million worldwide have died from COVID-19. In the U.S., a study of selected states and cities with data on COVID-19 deaths by race and ethnicity showed that 34 percent of deaths were among non-Hispanic Black people, though this

group accounts for only 12 percent of the total U.S. population. As a result of the disproportionate impact of the disease on Black, Hispanic, Native American, and other communities of color, efforts in Massachusetts and across the country have focused on ensuring the equitable distribution of the COVID-19 vaccine.

At the beginning of the COVID-19 vaccine distribution, a MassINC Polling Group survey, sponsored by the Museum of Science, the City of Boston, and conducted in partnership with the Massachusetts League of Community Health Centers, found that 38 percent of White residents said they would take the vaccine "as soon as possible" compared to 28 percent of Black residents and 22 percent of Hispanic residents.

Church members, such as Paulette Denise Chandler, M.D., M.P.H., a specialist in preventive medicine and internal medicine, who is affiliated with Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston, Massachusetts, explored why vaccine concerns exist in these populations and discussed strategies to address structural barriers and increase vaccine acceptance rates among diverse populations.

Through virtual town halls, webinars, and in-person events, Chandler served as a panelist for COVID-19 vaccine discussions with various organizations, including the Black Ministerial Alliance of Boston, Brigham and Women's Hospital Center for Community Wellness, Suffolk House of Corrections, and the Massachusetts League of Community Health Centers. "People wanted the

information to be able to make the right decision about the COVID-19 vaccine for themselves and their family members," Chandler said. "Attendees were so grateful to have their questions answered and gain confidence in their decision to receive a COVID-19 vaccine."

Fuel Up: Healthy Food for a **Healthy Life**

Chandler founded Fuel Up: Healthy Food for a Healthy Life, an afterschool nutrition and cooking class program at Brigham and Women's Hospital Center for Community Wellness at Sportsmen's Tennis and Enrichment Center (STEC), and serves as one of the instructors for the cooking class series. Mandy Bass and other STEC staff also help conduct sessions. The program continued online or in-person during the COVID-19 pandemic. STEC staff have embraced the program and enjoy preparing recipes with the children. They learn how to prepare healthy, plant-based recipes and about the nutritious benefits of various fruits, vegetables, beans, herbs, nuts, and seeds. They also taste new ingredients. Lime, cabbage, and pumpkin seeds are big favorites!

Addressing Mental Health Needs and Social Isolation

Bernadette Henry and Phoebe Odhiambo, Women's Ministries leaders at Framingham Centre church in Framingham, Massachusetts, decided to lead the women in a variety of outreach efforts. Members of Women's Minstries supported the community engagement opportunities in different ways, from monetary donations to preparing gift bags for women at the family shelter next door to the church. They decided to reach out to college students and send care packages to let their student members know that they were remembered. They also visited seniors and gave them flowers or a plant and a gift bag. Odhiambo, who is also a nurse, conducted a special Sabbath session

on how to deal with depression and anxiety.

Lifeboat Boston: Providing Both Physical and Spiritual Nourishment

Before the coronavirus pandemic, more than 35 million people experienced hunger, according to the USDA's Household Food Insecurity in the United States report. Some households that experience food insecurity do not qualify for federal nutrition programs and must rely on their local food banks and other hunger relief organizations for access to food. In the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic, unemployment and food insecurity soared, and more than 42 million people may face hunger because of the coronavirus.

Food pantries such as the Lifeboat Boston Food Pantry, operated by Boston Temple in Boston, Massachusetts, since 2017, helped address this vital need in their community during the pandemic. Lifeboat Boston was founded by Melissa Ghulam-Smith, M.D., and Kevin Smith, and Glacier Gray is the former director. According to Orlando Hall, Boston Temple church pastor, "Before the coronavirus pandemic, the food pantry assisted some 60-80 families each week; post-pandemic, that number rose to serving 110-

130 families on Thursdays and 30 families on Tuesdays." Lifeboat Boston partnered with the City of Boston's contact tracing program and the Boston Public Schools to provide food to families and students. On Tuesdays. Lifeboat Boston volunteers deliver food to families living in the Boston neighborhoods who cannot physically get to a pantry.

Not only is Lifeboat Boston blessing the community, but its volunteers are reaping rich spiritual blessings, as well. Lifeboat Boston's goal is to develop the culture of community through a consistent demonstration of compassion flowing through its core group of ministry workers. Hall and Zienna Forbes, an elder, highlight the commitment of non-Adventist volunteers who dedicate time each week to ensure the program's success. For example, Nansee Öng and her husband, Somsac, have led out in organizing the food each week since the start of the ministry. Students from Northeastern University and other area schools enjoy the camaraderie of the ministry team as they help package food bags and listen to the prayers before the team starts working. One volunteer from the community commented, "I like the family feel at Lifeboat!"

Ruth Frenchwood had been studying the Bible with Forbes for

several months before inquiring about a church ministry in which she could participate. Forbes suggested Lifeboat Boston. Frenchwood experienced anxiety and sadness while going through the lockdowns and restrictions resulting from the pandemic. Being active in Lifeboat Boston, enjoying the human contact while making the food deliveries, and interacting with people receiving the food bags has helped her deal with the depressive feelings and elevated her desire to live for God while caring for His people. "I don't help Lifeboat Boston. Lifeboat Boston helps me!" says Frenchwood, who was baptized in December 2020 and has requested special time off from her job on Thursdays to volunteer with the ministry. "Breaking the cycle of selfcenteredness [with] Lifeboat Boston [has] helped me see how much God loves me. It is thrilling to my heart to live at the level of compassion that is missing so often in life."

Sharon Hamel is another Lifeboat Boston volunteer who sees ministering through Lifeboat Boston as a means of responding to God's Word by being the hands and feet of Jesus. "Coming to Lifeboat Boston has been an important action toward practicing my faith," Hamel says. "Every time I try to imagine what

I want in life, the more and more I come to [understand] the fact that life is about service to others. Jesus said it is more blessed to give than to receive (Acts 20:35)."

Jesus said, "For I was hungry and you gave Me food; I was thirsty and you gave Me drink; I was a stranger and you took Me in; I was naked and you clothed Me; I was sick and you visited Me; I was in prison and you came to Me. . . . Assuredly, I say to you, inasmuch as you did it to one of the least of these My brethren, you did it to Me"—Matthew 25:35-36, 40. NKIV. The members of Boston Temple are discovering that coming together with the common purpose of ministering to and serving others results in empowered living and is energizing them as a church.

"Being connected to my church community outside of church time, working as a team, and being connected to God's larger community has revitalized me spiritually," says Hamel. Frenchwood. who studies the Sabbath School lesson with Forbes and other women on weekday mornings, sees ministering to others as an extension of her newfound faith. "I'm not just praying and studying. Now I can practice what I'm learning," she says. "As I'm learning about God, I'm able to help others learn about

Him, and it helps me be less focused on myself."

In Luke 10:25-27 (paraphrase), Jesus reminds us that when we "love the Lord our God with all our heart, with all our soul, with all our strength . . . with all our mind, and our neighbor as ourself" we "will live."

During these months of uncertainty, many churches sought to meet the needs in their community by partnering with organizations, collaborating with other individuals or ministries, or stepping out into uncharted waters to start new initiatives. As we attempt to navigate a post-pandemic society, the work remains—people still need health education and mental health services, they experience loneliness, and they need help combating food insecurity. Let us continue to be faithful to doing the Lord's work, for as we minister to others, we serve Him.

Determined to Endure

he Word of God declares that the activity and/ or quality of endurance is an integral part of the salvation equation. Thus, Matthew 24:13 (KJV) states, "He that shall endure unto the end, the same shall be saved." Here, the Bible uses the auxiliary verb "shall" to denote a formal obligatory interaction between one's endurance and their salvation. A few Bible translations (NIV. NLT. NRSV) use the modal verb "will" in this context ("will be saved"), since both terms generally follow similar grammatical rules.

"Shall be saved" or "will be saved" does not refer to what Jesus did at the cross when He saved us from the penalty of sin by His death. Nor does it refer to what He is doing every day by saving people from the power of sin by His grace. It clearly refers to what He will do when He returns to save us from the presence of sin at His second advent.

"Shall" highlights the certainty, surety, and security of God's promise in the aforementioned text. It engenders confidence, propels faith, transmits hope, and gives believers a reason to "endure to the end." Thus, "shall" serves to supplement the word "endure" in the focus scripture.

In this context, "endure" conjures up the imagery of one who is going somewhere in particular—moving toward a goal. Exploring the verb "endure" is essential for our consideration.

Accordingly, the Cambridge Dictionary states that to endure is "to suffer something difficult, unpleasant, or painful;" "to last;" "to suffer something difficult or unpleasant in a patient way over a long period;" or "to continue or carry on, despite obstacles or hardships." It also suggests key synonyms for the term, such as tolerate, ride out, suffer, persist, persevere, undergo, brave, weather, and withstand.

God's people who "endure to the end" will face end-time trials, temptations, and trouble from various angles. He said, "These things I have spoken to you, that in Me you may have peace. In the world you will have tribulation; but be of good cheer, I have overcome the world"—John 16:33, NKJV. Yes, many may stumble, fall, topple, and roll over,



but God reminds His people that they have His power, His almighty power available to empower them to stand up and continue on the "to the end" path.

Albeit, one quality of the person who endures is determination. Thus "he that endures to the end" is whomever is determined to go, determined to ride out all the fiery darts of the enemy and to go with Jesus to His heavenly home. 1 Corinthians 9:24-27 says, "Do you not know that those who run in a race all run, but one receives the prize? Run in such a way that you may obtain it. And everyone who competes for the prize is temperate in all things. Now they do it to obtain a perishable crown, but we for an imperishable crown. Therefore I run thus: not with uncertainty. Thus I fight: not as one who beats the air. But I discipline my body and bring it into subjection, lest, when I have preached to others, I myself should become disqualified" (NKJV).

Every child of God, every youth, young adult, and youngat-heart person is called to be one who is determined to endure to the end—until Jesus returns. Maranatha! ①

Christ declared, I have pledged myself, as the only begotten Son of the Lord God Almighty, to carry out God's plan to win souls from Satan. The Saviour alone can defeat the

enemy. He works in man's behalf to uncover his plans, that souls may be led to turn from the arch-deceiver.

The Prince of heaven, he who was one with the Father, gave himself to redeem the fallen race. Satan is actively and untiringly at work to defeat the Saviour's purpose. But Christ says, Where Satan has set his throne, there will I establish my cross. The prince of evil shall be cast out, and I will become the center of a world redeemed.

In his life on this earth, Christ lived the law of God, thus making it possible for men of every nation and every clime to live, under the sorest temptation, a life of true obedience. Those who accept God as their Creator and Christ as their Redeemer, receive the spirit of obedience that was revealed in the life of him who came to make known to men the Father. O the depth of the riches both of the wisdom and love of God!

Christ came to give to men the wealth of eternity, and this wealth, through connection with him, we are to receive and impart. Not to ministers only, but to every believer, Christ says, The world is enshrouded in darkness. Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven. Every one who truly loves God will be a light in the world.

He who is a citizen of the heavenly kingdom will be constantly looking at things not seen. The power of



earth over the mind and character is broken. He has the abiding presence of the heavenly Guest, in accordance with the promise, "I will love him, and will manifest myself to him." He walks with God as did Enoch, in constant communion.

The ministry of the word rests not merely upon those who preach the word, but upon all who hear and receive the word. God calls upon his people to break the bands of their precise, indoor service. He would have hundreds in our cities doing the work that Christ did while on this earth,—cheering the sorrowful, strengthening the weak, comforting the mourners, preaching the gospel to the poor. In many of the large cities scarcely anything has been done to proclaim the message of warning. Our brethren and sisters living in these crowded centers should let their light shine forth. You may think that your light is too small to do any good, but remember that it is what God has given you, and that you are held responsible to let it shine forth. Some one else may light his taper from it, and his light may be the means of leading others out of darkness.

The Saviour allowed nothing to interfere with the accomplishment of his work. He declared, "My meat is to do the will of him that sent me, and to finish his work." He mingled constantly with men, not to encourage them in anything that was not in accordance with God's will, but to uplift and ennoble them. "I sanctify myself," he declared, "that they also might be sanctified." No other teacher ever placed such signal honor upon men as did Christ. He was known as the friend of publicans and sinners. He mingled with all classes of society, that all, high and low, rich and poor, might share in the blessings he came to impart.

Daily beset by temptation, constantly opposed by the leaders of the people, Christ knew that he must strengthen his humanity by prayer. In order to be a blessing to men, he must commune with God, pleading for energy, perseverance, and steadfastness. Thus he showed his disciples where his strength lay. Without this daily communion with God, no human being can gain power for service. It is the privilege of every one to commit himself, with all his trials and temptations, his sorrows and disappointments, to the loving Heavenly Father. No one who does this, who makes God his confidant, will fall a prey to the enemy.

"We have not an high priest which can not be touched with the feeling of our infirmities; but was in all points tempted like as we are, yet without sin. Let us therefore come boldly unto the throne of grace, that we may obtain mercy, and find grace to help in time of need."

There is a great work to be done. God's servants are to go from house to house, watching for opportunities to sow the seeds of truth. But many of God's people act as if he desired them to hide their light under a bushel. The Lord says, Bring forth your light. Set it on a candlestick, that it may give light to all that are in the house. Wake up, my brethren and sisters, wake up, and work for the conversion of souls. Do not find fault and criticize. Thus you spend your energies in Satan's cause. Do not give way to anger because you think that you are misunderstood. Was not your Master misunderstood? Speak no word of doubt or unbelief. The more you talk of the difficulties in the way, the larger will they appear. Do not accuse your brethren. Rather accuse yourselves. An untold amount of mischief is done by words of faultfinding and slander. Never tear down the reputation of a fellow being.

The Lord is grieved when his people stand aloof from one another. Thus they show their weakness, and range themselves on the enemy's side. Let no one weaken the hands of another. Let

every man do what he can to build up, not to tear down.

Guard jealously your hours for prayer and self-examination. Set apart some portion of each day for a study of the Scriptures and communion with God. Thus you will obtain spiritual strength, and grow in grace and favor with God. He alone can direct our thoughts aright. He alone can give us noble aspirations, and fashion our characters after the divine similitude. If we draw near to him in earnest prayer, he will fill our hearts with high and holy purposes, and with deep, earnest longing for purity and cleanness of thought.

Moses prayed to God, saying, "I beseech thee, show me thy glory." And God said, "I will make all my goodness pass before thee. . . . And the Lord passed by before him, and proclaimed, The Lord, The Lord God, merciful and gracious, long-suffering, and abundant in goodness and truth, keeping mercy for thousands, forgiving iniquity and transgression and sin, and that will by no means clear the guilty; visiting the iniquity of the fathers upon the children, and upon the children's children, unto the third and to the fourth generation."

In this representation the Lord desired to teach the lesson that he requires in his people purity of character and holiness of life. He desires to see revealed in them mercy, loving-kindness and long-suffering, that they may demonstrate that "the law of the Lord is perfect, converting the soul." He imparts the richest blessings to those who serve him with a pure heart. He teaches each one who opens the heart to his instruction and obeys his voice. 0

Bermuda Women Spend a Weekend in the Word

Tnder the theme "In His Presence," the Bermuda Conference Women's Ministries Department enjoyed a spirituallyenriching weekend in the Word, April 23-25, with four gifted and anointed women of God: Adrienne Townsend-Benton, Lola Moore Johnston, Della Patton, and Marleena Debrough.

Townsend-Benton, chaplain, motivational speaker, and Amazon bestselling author, opened the virtual meetings on Friday evening, April 23, with "Cry Out." Referring to Jonah 2, she said, "It's hard to be in God's presence when you're running from Him." Still, through Jonah's experience, we learned that God delivers from seemingly impossible situations: when in the belly of a whale; when up against a wall; when in the middle of a problem, pray, praise, repent, ask, and then yield. She urged viewers not to wait until they see the reward, the situation improved, or the challenge removed. "Cry out with victory and thanksgiving. God will answer, and when you let go of what you know God does not want in your life, you'll receive peace."

Sabbath-morning services began with Early Morning Manna. Della Patton, a member of the North Bronx church in Bronx, New York, cautioned that we could be

with God but not experience His presence. So, before we can stand in His presence, we must examine ourselves, meditate, pray, and fast. Being in God's presence is transformative, and once we develop an intimate relationship with Him, we can hear His voice and know that we are favored. "Stay in His presence, for in His presence, there is joy, power, and peace," she said.

"If there is one thing this pandemic can teach us, it is that we need to be still," said Johnston, senior pastor of the Woodbridge church in Virginia and the worship service speaker. Her sermon, "Have a Seat," based on Luke 10:38-42, pointed out that we sometimes believe, as Martha did, that when we are in God's presence, there's something for us to do, explaining, "But I believe Martha overestimated her contribution, underestimated her need in Jesus' presence, and forgot to estimate her gift." She said we sometimes focus on our ability and forget that God is a provider. "In this season, God is asking us to have a seat. . . . Take a seat at His feet, soak in His presence, and trust that being in His presence is the most profound thing we can do."

Johnston, also the Sabbath-evening speaker, encouraged learning from Esther that God delivers and positions His people in places where they can speak



to the powers that oppress His people. "We cannot be asleep in this season," she said. "Wake up! Get up! God needs people to speak out and speak up so that He might bless them and do something amazing through them."

To complete the weekend's meetings, Marleena Debrough, pastor of Willowgrove church in Pennsylvania, spoke on "Walk in My Joy." Using John 15:9-11 as her sermonic text, she explained that God wants to supersize our blessings and give us complete joy, which only comes through Him. "Jesus' joy blesses our lives when we engage in selfless acts, obey God, and tell others of His goodness.

"There are joy stealers who cause us stress, hopelessness, and anger, but the benefits of Jesus' joy are that they provide strength,

identity, healing, peace, stability, joy, and pleasures forever." She challenged everyone to hold on to God and to let no one steal their joy.

Michelle Hill, Pembroke church pastor and Bermuda Conference Women's Ministries director; Lynne Wade, Women's Ministries leader from the Warwick church; and Jaylaka Matthie, Southampton church, hosted "In His Presence."

Hill thanked the Women's Ministries team, the participants, the technical operators, and the viewers for a phenomenal weekend and encouraged everyone to consistently live for God, to abide in God's peace, and to stay in His presence.

Join Union Springs Academy as They Celebrate 100 Years - September 17-19

Tnion Springs Academy, in Union Springs, New York, is celebrating 100 years of ministry, dedication, and service in 2021. From its humble beginnings back in 1921, where it was purchased for \$4,000 (from a Quaker school named Oakwood Seminary), it has grown, changed, and been led by divine guidance and inspiration to become the school that still stands "near the shores of Lake Cayuga." The original property included 13 buildings and a 429-acre farm. The first students started school on September 14, 1921, in the original brick building, Cooledge Hall, with 13 faculty members and 96 students. Amazingly, these students did everything in this one building—from the time they started their day until the time they went to bed at night.

Over the years, the school has grown and changed, also expanding its physical presence to include two separate dormitories—the girl's dorm, Sunset Hall (1949) and the boy's dorm, Capman Hall (1957). Additionally, a gymnasium was built in the early 1960s, where students could participate in indoor recreation during the winter, which also provided a location for church services. Then in 1968, the administration portion was added to the gymnasium (subsequently named Newmyer Hall). An industrial arts building was constructed to provide shop classes for hands-on learning. In the early 1980s, a beautiful new church building was created, which allowed for enhanced religious activities and services for the students and community members.

Enrollment numbers have varied greatly over the years, impacted immensely by the economy, state of our country (many years during war-time conditions or the current pandemic), and level of support by conference leaders and churches.

Union Springs is the oldest full boarding academy still in operation in the Northeast. This is very much due to supportive church leaders, dedicated loyal alumni, generous donors, churches, and church members who have made the continuance of this school a priority. Most importantly, the prayers of our church members, parents, alumni, and so many others have had an eternal impact on our students by continually asking for the Holy Spirit to be present and guide the decisions made in the operation and future of this school.

At Union Springs Academy, there is a family feeling of closeness among the students. In addition to academic and physical needs, spiritual needs are a high priority. Their goal is to bring the students closer to our Savior and Creator, Jesus Christ, and guide them into a personal relationship with Him.

Throughout the history of the academy, students have had unique, life-changing experiences. The dedication to our youth and mission of our school continues to be carried forward 100 years later. As we celebrate 100 years, we would like to invite all alumni and former faculty and staff to celebrate God's goodness and leading at our Centennial Celebration/Alumni Weekend, September 17-19.

We have an amazing weekend planned to include our Sabbath church service speaker, Ted Wilson, Seventhday Adventist World Church president. Honored guest speakers also include: Bill Knott, Adventist Review executive editor; Gary Blanchard, General Conference Youth Ministries director; John Thomas, General Conference retired associate secretary; and Robert Burnette ('72), Oklahoma Conference assistant to the president. A Saturday-night Centennial Tribute Banquet and Variety Show are planned in celebration of this significant milestone. Join us in taking this opportunity to recognize our rich history and thank God for His leading!

Church in Brooklyn Closes on Affordable Housing **Development**

The Calvary First Nigerian **⊥** church in Brooklyn, New York, is the beneficiary of a ground lease which closed on May 11 between its parent body, the Northeastern Conference Corporation of Seventh-day Adventists, and the 811 Lexington Limited Partnership to build a multi-family affordable housing project. The 64 units will provide housing for senior citizens on land owned by the congregation and situated across the street from their church building.

Construction is expected to begin this summer.

The terms of the agreement stipulate that the parties have entered into a 99-year ground lease in which the church will receive yearly payments from the developer aggregating to a total of \$39.2 million during the term of the lease. At the end of the lease, the entire property will revert to the church. In the meantime, the church retains use of 20 underground parking spaces in

the new building for the duration of the contract.

Mark Brathwaite, the church's pastor, and local elder David Awoyomi spearheaded the four-year negotiation effort on behalf of the Calvary church. They aimed for a project that would benefit the church while bringing affordable housing to the community.

This is the third ground lease entered into by the conference on behalf of local churches during a two-year period. The current confer-

ence administration implemented this process to provide revenue streams to local congregations from previously underutilized assets. The conference retains 10 percent of the proceeds in each project for investment in the NEC Capital Development Endowment, which in turn generates income to assist NEC congregations with acquisition and renovation projects.

New York Landmarks Commission Approves Redevelopment Project

n May 12, the New York City Landmarks Commission approved a redevelopment plan for the Hebron Bilingual School in Brooklyn, New York, that calls for the construction of residential housing on land behind the school. The new construction is in conformity with current zoning laws but required Landmark Commission approval because it falls within a historic district. The proposed building is comparable in size to nearby residential housing and 30 percent of the units will be deemed affordable.

The Northeastern Conference Corporation, following a vote of the Hebron church members in business meeting, entered into a contract with Hope Street Capital to redevelop one-third of the 2.3 acre campus.

In exchange for ceding a portion of its land, the Hebron school will receive: \$23 million in cash, construction of a regulation-size gymnasium in the new building, a two-bedroom condominium unit, and 25 underground parking spaces.

The Hebron school was founded in 1975 by Adventist Haitian immigrants seeking to provide their children with academic excellence in the context of their culture and faith. Shortly thereafter, the Hebron church purchased the former Methodist Home for the Aged. The 80,000-square-foot structure has fallen into disrepair over the decades. Proceeds from the development will enable a refurbishment of the building.

Amazing Things Happening as School and Church Work Together in Portland, Maine

¶t wasn't too long ago— Lonly in pre-COVID times, really—that the relatively large White Memorial church in Portland, Maine, was having a crisis with school attendance. It had gotten to the point where the church had only four students going to Pine Tree Academy (PTA), the conference's flagship academy and the closest Adventist school, located some 25 minutes away in Freeport, Maine.

The crisis wasn't just with school attendance, for the church knows that when kids go to an Adventist school, they are more likely to remain Adventists and resist the pull of the world; the crisis was as much about the future of the church as it was about education.

At Pine Tree Academy, there were signs of concern, as well. Why were there so few students from the

Portland area? A series of conversations between the church, the school, and the parents pointed clearly at one major hurdle: kids needed help with transportation from Portland to Freeport, if they were able to attend Pine Tree Academy.

The school took action and purchased a 12-passenger van to ferry students to and from the school. This action of faith bore fruitthe church's Adventist parents decided to put their children in school, and the children loved it. Then they started telling their friends. Soon there were more children going to PTA than would fit in the van. So, the church acquired an older eight-passenger van. Soon that too was full. But unfortunately, that van died. Next, the school and church bought another 12-passenger van, but that filled up, and here is the interesting

thing: the second van pretty much filled up with students from the community around the church.

With the onset of COVID and its impact on public schools, many parents started looking for different education options, and many of those parents discovered Pine Tree Academy and ended up asking Portland church members, "Why have you kept this school secret?" Parents in the community wanted to send their kids to a great school, but they also wanted to know more about the Adventist Church. So many of the families with kids going to Pine Tree Academy started going to church or bringing their children to Sabbath School. After a while, many of those families also asked for Bible studies.

Today, the church has more students wanting to ride the two vans to Pine

Tree Academy than there are seats. And now, there are 24 additional students (more than enough to fill two more vans) who want to start attending the academy in the fall. Part of this explosive growth was the timing of national events, and part of it was Portland's Adventist families telling their friends about the school, but all of it was influenced by God to bring people into contact with His message.

The members are excited that God is at work. White Memorial church now has 30 active Bible studies and 60 more people who have indicated they want Bible studies in the future. Some of those people taking Bible studies have kids. They will need more vans (or a bus) to get everyone to school, and they have no doubt God will fill that need!

Williston Church Starts a Community Garden Ministry

ne of the interesting side effects of the pandemic era in the U.S. was that an explosion of gardening occurred as house-bound people tried to turn their backyards into oases of productivity. Not all who tried succeeded, and some didn't try because they lacked a backyard. One result, in practical terms, was a larger-than-usual population of frustrated would-be gardeners who wished they had more knowledge or more space, or perhaps both. Into this environment stepped the Williston church in Vermont with a potentially powerful community outreach program called the "Sow and Share Community Garden."

The garden is located on the church grounds, and church members put considerable effort into it, creating seed-ready open beds and raised beds, and erecting a greenhouse. One goal of the outreach is to help people have more healthy, fresh vegetables for their households. The other goal of the project is to form relationships between church members and community members throughout the gardening season.

"The church is blessed with a large lot," said Frentzen Pakpahan, the church's pastor, "and it is blessed with members who are skilled at gardening and want to reach out to their community, so this project just seemed to make sense. We had a work bee in early May to set up the gardening area, and quite a few church members came out to help. Since then, we've had several community members sign up to have garden plots at our church. One thing I really like about the project is that our members will be mentoring those gardeners who want help, so they'll form relationships. And those relationships don't need to end at harvest because our members can also show gardeners how to preserve their vegetables. Of course, our fellowship hall has a great kitchen for helping with that. Finally, for those gardeners who want, we're looking to teach people how to use their produce to eat healthier. This is a project that is based on a garden, but that keeps on going well after the gardening season has ended. The relationships it builds create an opportunity

to sow the gospel while our community is sowing seeds."

The Williston church is located just outside Vermont's largest city, Burlington, in the northwest corner of the state. It seeks

to "sow" the message of salvation through Christ to the vibrant population of the area.

Statewide Community Baby Shower Has Far-reaching Impact

n May 16, four community baby showers took place across Massachusetts in Attleboro, Clinton, Springfield, and Worcester. Each location provided physically distant access to free baby supplies and maternal wellness resources. With the help of community partners, a total of 30 families received essential baby supplies, clothes,

Nest Café hosted the site in Worcester.

Nicole Broushet, Glō Mom founder and co-owner of The Vegan Nest Café, sees the Adventist health message as a vital component in this work. "We often limit our health message to diet and nutrition," says Broushet. "That's a huge aspect of it, but health permeates every sin-

pregnancy advocacy, and other issues that impact mothers. Currently partnering with the College Church in Lancaster, Massachusetts, Broushet hopes that other Adventist churches will consider getting involved. "As a maternal health advocacy organization, it's really about empowering women and connecting them with resources that are going to give them the most support possible so that they can have a healthy pregnancy."

Glō Mom serves as a facilitator for the events and provides a bridge for church ministries to connect with families in their communities. "The church members do the important work as they get involved and stay involved with the families that we're supporting," Broushet explains. She shared how several

church ministries (e.g., Women's Ministries, Men's Ministries, Family Ministries, and Health Ministries) can all work together in this endeavor as they learn about the various needs of the families they encounter. "This is really total church involvement! There is something for everyone!" Broushet adds, "I sincerely hope that churches prayerfully consider getting involved . . . and [that they will take] these incredible truths that we have and truly [use] them to benefit others and the community around us."

"It's alarming! It truly is a health crisis when we have such a large number of women who are being affected," Broushet says.
