Sunday morning found a full hall and an early-morning prayer meeting still on the go. Sister Frederica Reid from the prayer team led out, inspiring prayer like never before. 'Someone' had been speaking to her through the night season.

God then acted. There were underlying issues that many had come to sense. We didn't 'know' what had happened, but we knew that God's will and way had to be done, and be seen to be done!


It was just after this prayer meeting that our president, Pastor Johnson; our secretary, Pastor Ferguson; and our former treasurer, Rejoice Kampengele, came to the floor. Are you in pain? Part 3 — Chronic pain: a closer look

The *British Journal of Pain* (2013 Nov; 7[4]: 209-217) published a paper entitled, 'Chronic pain epidemiology – where do lifestyle factors fit in?' It referenced many studies on pain, and highlighted the following:

Generalised pain

- 'The more severe the acute pain, and the greater the number of pain sites, the more likely it is that severe chronic pain will develop.'

 Chronic pain and mortality
- There appears to be a link between chronic pain, poor health, and increased mortality.

Chronic pain and cardiovascular health

 Those with severe chronic pain 'are up to three times more likely to die from ischaemic heart disease or respiratory disease than those with no chronic pain'.

Chronic pain and mental wellbeing

- 'Anxiety, depression and catastrophising beliefs about pain have been shown to be associated with the presence of chronic pain and with a poor prognosis in people with various pain conditions.'
 Chronic pain and physical wellbeing
- Several chronic physical wendering
 Several chronic physical conditions may increase the risk of chronic pair.

Chronic pain and obesity

• The impact of pain and poorer life quality is greater in individuals who are obese. • 'In older adults a higher BMI was clearly associated with an increased incidence and prevalence of pain.'

Sleep problems

• Disrupted sleep is 'a risk factor for the onset of chronic pain and predictive for pain persistence'.

Employment

- 'Individuals who are not able to work because of illness or disability are . . . more likely to report chronic pain than those who are employed.'
- 'Poor job control, expectations for return to work and fear of re-injury all contribute to occupational risk factors for the onset or persistence of pain.'

Gender

• 'Chronic pain syndromes generally have a higher prevalence in women.' • 'Women are over-represented . . . in the proportion of those seeking treatment for pain.' • 'There is some evidence [though by no means conclusive] to suggest that these gender-related differences are associated with [the] age-related hormonal changes of puberty and menopause involving oestrogen.'

Socioeconomic background

• 'People living in adverse socioeconomic circumstances not only experience more pain; they also experience more severe pain.'

The Department of Health's document entitled 'Essence of Care: 2010: Benchmarks for the Prevention and Management of Pain'² gives comprehensive guidelines and advice for health professionals and carers, and self-management tips for pain sufferers.

Good health!

Freedom of religion and worship: when did you last spare a thought for these privileges? If I am to be brutally honest with you, I very seldom do. Shamefully, I take this blessing for granted, even though millions of Christians don't share this freedom with me.

Open Doors, a 'watchdog' organisation that tracks the persecution of Christians, annually produces a World Watch List, which showed last year 'that approximately 100 million Christians' were being persecuted worldwide. According to their list, 'the type of persecution analysed ranged from government-inflicted, to violence carried out by terror groups.'1

Frankly, besides serious illness or injury, there is little that could threaten my weekly worship. Not even a flat battery would scupper my attendance — I can walk there in thirty minutes!

Some are dying for their faith

Although it's impossible to track just how many Christians are actually killed because of their commitment to Christ, 'Open Doors records show that worldwide there were over 7,000 Christians killed for faith-related reasons in the year [2015] – almost 3,000 more than the previous year.' This is by no means the full picture, however, as it excludes countries where accurate records do not exist: North Korea, Syria and Iraq.²

Those who hate Christians also have similar feelings about their places of worship. Last year this resulted in a surge of attacks against churches, with the number of reported incidents doubling to 'around 2,400'.3

It doesn't exist

Theoretically there are some countries in the world where Christianity doesn't 'officially' exist, the prime example being North Korea. This is how the World Watch List describes the situation for the 300,000-odd 'invisible' Christians who are thought to live there:

'North Korea is the most dangerous place in the world to be a Christian for the 14th year in a row. Christians face arrest, torture, imprisonment and death for daring to believe there is a higher authority than the nation's

leader, Kim Jong-un. Many follow Jesus in secret; parents often don't even tell their children about their faith for fear they will be revealed. Thousands of other Christians are trapped in horrific labour camps and isolated closed villages. But despite the risks, North Koreans are still choosing to follow Christ.'4

There are 50 countries on that watch list. Why not log on to *www.opendoorsuk.org* and see the descriptions they provide of the conditions under which our fellow believers are forced to live out their faith in these countries? It is a sobering exercise. Perhaps it will challenge you to join me in praying more faithfully for the millions who live daily with persecution in one or other of its many forms.

Displacement

In many of the countries on that watch list Christians experience pariah status. This takes many forms: such as restrictions on their political and civil rights, educational and employment opportunities, and where they can live or to where they can travel. For many, their only option is to leave behind what they cannot carry and join the world's rising tide of displaced people. How high has that tide risen?

'The U.N.'s refugee agency reports that the number of displaced people is at its highest ever – surpassing even post-World War II numbers, when the world was struggling to come to terms with the most devastating event in history.

'The total at the end of 2015 reached 65.3 million – or one out of every 113 people on Earth, according to the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR). The number represents a 5.8 million increase on the year before.'5

These are mind-numbing statistics. But we must not forget that each one of them is a fellow human being, each with his or her own story. These are people whose natural aspirations have intentionally been crushed by the privation, cruelty and suffering forced on them by others. The Word tells us that 'Jesus wept' outside the tomb of His friend Lazarus (John 11:35, KJV), and that on His approach to Jerusalem, 'when he drew near and saw the city, he wept over it,' knowing what lay ahead (Luke 19:41, ESV). How must He feel today?

Tears are the only weapons

Like Jesus, there are times when tears are our only weapons. We cannot retaliate. We can only weep and pray!

Persecution is a form of asymmetrical warfare. Warfare in which the only power we often have is our powerlessness! Let it never be said, however, that such powerlessness in the face of persecution is synonymous with weakness or cowardice. John the Baptist was powerless as he faced Herod's executioner, but not cowardly. Stephen was powerless against the hail of stones that crushed life from his body, but we dare not call him weak.

'Stop! What are you doing?' were the last words of Father Jacques Hamel, 86, before his throat was cut in his Normandy church the other week. At that gruesome moment, his nineteen-year-old killers, Adel Kermiche and Abdel Malik Petitjean, were elated, fuelled by the thought that they held the destiny of the frail, powerless priest in their hands.⁶

Just minutes later, though, both lay dead in the street outside the church. At which point the power shifted to the martyred priest. His stunned parishioners in St-Étienne-du-Rouvray were quick to heap honour and respect upon him for his beautiful life. The Rouen Cathedral was packed with those who came to lay him to rest, including local Muslims horrified by his death, and the archbishop said this:

'Our world has proven united from one side of the planet to the other. Injustices between people have become intolerable. Faced with the horrible and unjust death of a simple priest, messages have come from around the world. Hope is on the march.'⁷

Perhaps it is time to take Paul seriously:

'Think constantly of those in prison as if you were prisoners at their side. Think too of all who suffer as if you shared their pain.' (Hebrews 13:3, J.B. Phillips New Testament.)

Car boot sale for Jesus!

Here is what some of our members from the island of Jersey are doing to witness.

ur members on Jersey have long debated just how to intentionally reach out to our fellow islanders. Among the many ideas discussed was one raised by Richard one Sabbath afternoon – 'Why not distribute books for free at a car boot

We decided to try this. Fortunately we had a number of books in stock and the only challenge was finding a portable table that would be suitable for a car boot setting. Instead of procrastinating, it was decided to praverfully take up the challenge the next day!

A table was found that Sabbath evening and two catchphrases were later suggested for marketing

purposes. The intention was to write the phrases on large pieces of paper and stick them in front of the table with the hope of drawing the attention of as many people as possible to our little store. The phrases were:

- The most important things in life are free: everything else is not really free.
- There is nothing like a free lunch: only for today you can grab a free book!

The titles available for distribution included The Great Controversy, Steps to Christ. Health and Wellness and Dr Arnott's 24 Realistic Ways to Improve Your Health.

We arrived at the boot sale location early the next morning



and were finished setting up the table by about 8.20am. The catchphrases were attached onto the front of the table. On the sides, two large A4 cards were inscribed with the words, 'Free Books' in bold print.

It took quite a long time before someone accepted a free

Many would pass by, read the two phrases, give us a half-mast smile and move on. We took comfort in the fact that although no one had as vet picked a book. at least we had managed to ignite an early-morning smile on the

faces of some of them. We comforted ourselves with the thought that it was a unique form of evangelism!

Then we decided that, instead of waiting for the customers to come to us, we would go from car to car and give the books to our fellow car boot sellers.

The hand of the Lord was apparent in that almost every other seller was willing to accept a copy of one or other book. Some even accepted more than one copy. Some were kind enough to engage us in conversation, asking questions about our African heritage, while others even got to discuss 'light' spiritual issues with us. A large number of the books were handed out this way.

Now that almost every car owner in the field had a book or two, there was no choice but to patiently wait for other interested people to come to the table and collect a free copy.

Among the first to come was a man named Jim. He was a school builder by profession and had spent a considerable time in Kenya. After a long chat about African heritage and politics, he left the table having accepted two books and given us his contact details. Apparently he has connections to the donor community who assist with the building of schools in African countries. I quickly suggested Zimbabwe as a possible

religion and our motives. Others asked why the books were being given away free and yet this was a car boot 'sale'.

One young fellow came and picked a copy of Steps to Christ; then before leaving he grabbed a thick copy of *The Great* Controversy for his dad. Since it was Father's Day, we all marvelled at the little boy's ingenuity. What better gift to bless your father with than eternity.

One of our longest conversations was with a lady who was visiting from Poland. We later discovered that she was a Christian and she gratefully took a copy of the Health and Wellness book before leaving.

David, a member of the Jehovah's Witnesses, provided some delightful company, during which he used his multilingual skills in an attempt to learn a few Bantu words. He told us about the countries he had visited, as well as sharing a JW pamphlet on unclean and clean foods with

The most pleasant aspect of

the day was that most people who passed by the table were very kind and nice to us. This felt good.

They were also interested in knowing about topics that were covered in the books. In many cases we had to quickly share a short summary of each book with them: more like what doorstep salespeople do!

The best relationship of the day was developed with the gentleman who was selling automotive paint next to our table. He was such a free-spirited person who showed great delight after we expressed admiration of his Mercedes Benz. This opened up the way for more conversation and we were later able to give him two of our books that are linked to the health message.

At some point he tried to sell me a soft brown cashmere iacket. Although it was a perfect fit, I told him that a jacket of this style would be more suited to my elderly father. Surprisingly, before we left, he called out and gave me the jacket for free. At least I

was not the only lad who got a free gift to give to my dad on that Father's Day.

One of the ladies we met explained that she had multiple sclerosis. After learning of her illness. I rushed back to the table and got her another book. I thought the recommendations in Dr Arnott's book would be more suited to her situation.

She was really glad and thanked us for the effort. On meeting my colleague later, she reiterated that she would definitely read the books.

I observed that most of the people who took up The Great Controversy were intrigued by the historical element of the book. This became a successful selling point as we mentioned the rise and fall of popes, the Reformation and the counter-Reformation, and the way in which the Bible has stood the test of time.

Without a doubt, the best 'seller' of the day was Dr Arnott's book. It appears that the health message has the power to create endless opportunities to meet people (that we otherwise would

not have met) at their point of greatest need.


Indeed Ellen White couldn't have expressed it better when she described this aspect of our message as the 'right hand' of the Gospel.

A colossal shock to the tune of £90,000!

t sometimes takes a shock to bring a person to their senses! How about a £90,000 shock? Well, that's what five adults and their six children got when they independently discovered that their financial futures looked really bleak due to crippling debt.

The first was the Andrada family. After years of work, Joey and Girlie realised that the financial hole they were in would only get deeper unless they took serious action. Meanwhile, on the other bank of the Tyne, Steven Katebe discovered that the hole in his pockets was ruining his spiritual life and lowering his chances of future financial stability. Thankfully, Stephen found a guide in American Christian financial author and radio show host. Dave Ramsev. The third family to become aware of the seriousness of their financial situation was the Samwinga family, Although their plight may have been partly due to an honourable cause – helping family – Victor and Lynne realised that they were building their financial house on a sandy shore as their credit card and overdraft debts began to mount, leaving

them with more month left at the end of the money!

That all this happened in one church should help us realise that there are undoubtedly many similar issues with families in churches the world over. The fact that the individuals involved are well-educated Christians with professional careers also shows that getting out of financial control can happen to anyone.

Where does this fit in the

It takes courage to reveal one's financial instability, especially when you are an elder who is about to preach on Sabbath morning. Thankfully, Joey Andrada had the courage and the tact to share his family's financial problems with the congregation during his sermon. Providentially. the three groups mentioned above met and started to talk about their situations. Feelings of shame, quilt and anger lead many to refuse to talk about money problems. It was no different for the group – at first, opening up was a little awkward, but with time the discussions became therapeutic and a source of

encouragement. They each acknowledged that, while they were all sensible people, good Christians and intelligent professionals, things had gone wrong with their attitude to money and their approach to its management.

Stephen was quick to reveal that he was beginning to see progress in his personal finances through following Dave Ramsey's simple but sensible financial guidance. The individuals soon began to experiment with these new ideas on personal finance. The first stage had been the realisation that something had to be done or else things would only get worse. The second stage was realising that something could be done. Learning to establish and live on a budget was the most significant skill they all learnt, followed by a seven-step process towards financial solvency.

Money is at the heart of stewardship

Each person in the group began to recognise that there was light at the end of their very dark tunnel. It was at this point that the word 'stewardship' cropped up. Stewardship leaders over the years have tried to encourage members to think that stewardship isn't just about money. An article in adventist stewardship.com has the following quote:

'We work together with God. We are stewards of our lives. Since we live within time and space, we are also stewards of our time and our environment. We were created in God's image. This image is what we are and finds expression in every aspect of our being. We are, therefore, stewards of our bodies, of our spiritual life, of our mental and intellectual capacities, and of our social being,' writes Paoring L. Ragui, quoting Dr Angel Rodriguez.

That said, if your monetary situation is a mess, your spiritual life, mental and intellectual capacities and social relationships may become affected too. Stewardship really can come back to how we look after money. No wonder Billy Graham once said, 'If a person gets his attitude towards money straightened out, then almost all other areas of his life will be straightened out.' When God's people start to put their financial houses in order, they also tend to straighten up spiritually because both areas require acknowledging God's sovereignty and ownership of it all. When this happens, they start to give more consistently. Consistent giving in turn makes them less selfish. Less selfish individuals tend to become better husbands, wives, sons, church members or employees! Ultimately, improving one's financial stewardship can result in healthier marriages, families. churches and societies, and overall God's kingdom and His work will prosper!

Tithes and offerings came down to the bottom of the list at one time. The paying of bills was prioritised, but the spiritual cost of doing that can be very high as the guilt of withholding money from God grows from week to week. However, as our friends' plans developed, so their spiritual confidence to return tithes and give healthy regular offerings grew. Their Christian stewardship was also improving as they learnt some practical moneymanagement skills, based on biblical principles.

The plan (baby steps)

What of the plans? Was the whole developing success story

down to having a budget? Dave Ramsey in his seminars and books advises 7 baby steps to financial fitness. The first step is to set aside £1,000 in an emergency fund; the second is paying off all non-mortgage debt with a debt snowball approach; while the third baby step is to establish a fully funded emergency fund by saving the equivalent of 3 to 6 months of expenses.

At this point the questions arise. How on earth can I do this? It is so drastic! The answer is quite simple: accept this by faith, as countless listeners to Dave Ramsey's American radio show regularly do with success. The human response to such advice is to question why things should be done in such a way. However, when all you have is a track record of financial mess, it is better to try doing things differently for a chance to get different results. By faith, these baby steps work as a very spiritual action to develop

financial security.

The next of the steps is to invest 15% of your monthly income sensibly and conservatively to ensure a dignified retirement. The smart person would then create a college fund for their children. The next is to pay off your home early. The final step, and the ultimate purpose of the whole exercise, is to build wealth in order to maximise giving.

Such a plan isn't just theory – with God's help it works. On the last day of December 2015, fizzy drink corks popped as those families announced that their combined indebtedness of £90,000 had all been repaid – months ahead of schedule!

A ministry is born

As a result, the group started a ministry in September 2015 called the SmartStewards, with the sole aim of transforming lives by helping families to become more intentional in managing their personal finances. On the last day of April 2016 this ministry's team used the Sabbath to promote sensible monetary care as a spiritual ministry. Practical lessons included budgeting – the process, challenges and benefits. The listeners heard that budgets were not a once-a-year chore but a monthly enjoyable experience used to decide on priorities and what's worth spending one's money on. It is easier to give when there's a plan - goals and

priorities are set – and when there's no debt! It makes it so much easier to praise God when His care for us can be easily reported.

Jan, who is the eldest of the children in the group, about to enter university and himself a SmartSteward, recounted during the event that the experience of dealing with debt over the past couple of years had drawn the family closer together.

Indeed, the process the group had embarked upon also brought them closer together as Christians. They now have freedom from guilt, healthier finances – and a life-changing ministry God has given them to help others avoid similar mistakes or work their way out of their own financial difficulties.

The team developed the SmartStewards concept, which gave birth to a Facebook-based group that currently has 730 members. Daily posts encourage spiritual but highly practical financial stewardship - personal money management – beyond just giving tithes and offerings. Along with local pastor, Peter Jevnes, as an occasional contributor, our once financially hapless individuals can now proudly say they are Smart Stewards and recognise that God has brought them to freedom from the slavery of consumer debt in order for them to serve others.

Lessons learnt

What do we learn from all this? It isn't just the 'hopeless' layabout who gets into financial trouble. Even those who love the Lord and serve their church can still mess up their personal finances.

Rare personal and family disasters are not always the cause of debt and financial ruin. A wrong mindset and the failure to actively plan and manage one's finances based on sound spiritual principles is more likely to be the cause of debt and financial problems.

For the two couples in the story, personal finance and planning has now become a family affair and not just the responsibility of one guiding hand. The result is increased communication on money matters and family priorities, resulting in less conflict and disharmony.

The seven baby steps really do work; seeing them in action develops faith. However, there is no magic wand to healthier finances. This approach will not work if no effort and discipline is exerted. It takes time to learn to discipline yourself to care effectively for your money. ha Patience is learned and this is only one of the great bonuses.


Simply saving money is not the real issue. A plan and an aim to develop the lives of others is the key to the whole process. Anybody can become debt-free but only smart stewards sort out their financial affairs so that they can give to enhance the lives of others while giving the glory to God.

The resulting spiritual benefits are enormous. Three families now happily return tithes and

offerings, and have a good Samaritan fund in their budgets. They are also well able to detail numerous times when God really has opened the windows of heaven in blessing.

The children in each family have learned principles and skills that will have long-lasting benefits. They are being equipped for life.

Of course the reader may well say, 'But I'm happy with my life as it is.' True, we can choose to spend, spend, spend with no thought for tomorrow – but think of the legacies we then leave our children and the opportunity we lose to make a difference in God's work and the lives of others around us.

A 'strong constitution' is required

hen I first heard that my name was being considered to serve the church as Executive Secretary of the British Union Conference, I started to do a bit of research. What kind of skills would I need? What kind of help would I get? How much actual work would be involved?

Among the numerous pieces of advice that I received was one which particularly stuck in my mind and which may be the most important among my new responsibilities: 'You'll need a strong constitution!'

Now my initial understanding was that the person was referring to the long office hours, tedious committees and extensive travel involved. 'A strong constitution' is something you need when faced with an onerous task, a plate of unpalatable food, or a particularly malodorous cleaning job. So, yes, I could see that the requirement made sense.

However, I later realised that the advice carried a much more important meaning. My very first assignment as Executive Secretary. on the second day of this year's BUC Session at Newbold College, was to chair the business session dealing with 'the constitution'. This kind of 'constitution' is a totally different kettle of fish. It is the set of principles which define

who we are and how we operate as a church.

Until recently I hadn't given it much thought. I'm a fourth-generation Seventh-day Adventist and I love and care deeply for my church. The church has always been there for me and I assumed that it always would be. But the church does not exist by chance. The fact that we are here, still together despite our diversity, and growing faster than most churches in the world, is at least partly due to the painstaking work of those who, over the last hundred years or so, have carefully crafted our constitution.

We are not Seventh-day Adventists just because we believe in the Sabbath and the second coming of Jesus. We are not Seventhday Adventists because we watch a particular Adventist television channel. We are Seventhday Adventists because all of us, from the humblest administrative office to the largest megachurch, adhere to the principles which define us in the *Church Manual*, the General Conference's Working Policy, and, as we work this out in our local fields, our own constitution documents.

Is this really important? Well, yes, I'm afraid it is. There are forces within our own church which are, right now, trying to divide us. 'We don't need the church structure,' they say. 'We don't need a set of documents to tell us what to do!

These damaging forces have been with us right from the start, and they led to the production of the first Church Manual in 1932. As far back as 1875 Ellen White wrote this: 'The church of Christ is in constant peril. Satan is seeking to destroy the people of God, and one man's mind, one man's judgement, is not sufficient to be trusted. Christ would have His followers brought together in church capacity, observing order, having rules and discipline, and all subject one to another, esteeming others better than themselves.' Testimonies for the Church, vol. 3, p. 445.

As a church we actually do have a strong constitution. At the BUC Session we voted to strengthen ours still further by bringing it more closely into harmony with the world church. But we need to be vigilant. On your local church boards, and on the various other committees which keep the church operating, listen out for the negative and divisive voices. When you hear them, challenge them! It won't be easy. You may need to be assertive. In fact you may need 'a strong constitution' to defend who we are and what we have as a church.

Constitutional reform at BUC Session

How many Christians does it take to change a light bulb? It's one of those perennial jokes. For Charismatics, apparently, it's only one – as their hands are already in the air. For the Baptists, it's at least 15: one to change the light bulb, and the rest to approve the change and arrange the food for the potluck lunch. The list can go on – just google it.

For Seventh-day Adventists at the British Union Session on Friday, 1 July 2016, it took 241: this being the number of delegates who sat through more than four hours of constitutional minutiae in order to bring the present constitution in line with the General Conference's present model and the UK Charity Commission requirements.

Most changes were fairly academic, though time-consuming, as a two-thirds majority is needed for any change. With electronic voting, that takes roughly 90 seconds per item.

The longest section of discussion related to Article 9, and involved a suggestion to move back to an earlier model for the timing and functioning of the Nominating Committee for Union Sessions. In the current system the Recommendations Committee and the Nominating Committee meet some weeks prior to Session. Some felt that this was unwieldy and potentially unfair, and that holding these meetings during Session was preferable. Alternatively, some of those who sat on this year's Nominating Committee preferred the system as it gave much more time for the consideration of names and didn't compete with the main meetings and reports in the Session.

There was genuine passion and concern expressed by both those who wanted to go back to the old system, and those who wanted to work to modify and improve the current system.

With the need for a two-thirds majority for change the choice for change was defeated: 61% for, 38% against. The BUC will continue with the present system while seeking ways to improve it. Full details of the recommended changes can be found in the supplementary handbook

Three ministers ordained at NEC Session

Sabbath was especially welcome on 23 July at the Macron Stadium, providing a 'regime of calm' amid the deliberations of a lively North England Conference session. An estimated 1,700 day visitors joined the 300 or so church delegates for that Sabbath's Day of Fellowship, with many staying for the afternoon to see Pastors Noel Apugan, Obinnaya Genbrite Iheoma and Roman Smejkal being ordained to the Gospel ministry

Noel hails from the Philippines, and supported his college studies with the 'Publishing Student Programme', selling literature every summer for seven years until his graduation in 1992. He found this so rewarding that he then became a credentialled literature evangelist, and subsequently an assistant publishing director, before moving to the UK in 2003 and attending the Stockport church as a lay member. Although humble about his qualities, he was persuaded to join the NEC pastoral team in 2008 by Stockport's pastor, Geoff Smith, who introduced him to the session congregation. Since then he's been serving on the Isle of Man, and, according to Pastor Smith, Noel's sense of humour is proving to be a great asset.

Pastor lheoma has a different background. His degrees are in Petroleum Engineering, and Leadership and Management in Education, but in 2007 he started studying for the ministry at Newbold, and after his graduation in 2010 he served in Scotland until 2013. Pastor Bernie Holford, then Scottish Mission President, recalled during his introduction that he took great pleasure in reviewing the statistics for Pastor Iheoma's church, and discovered that the secret to his success was his remarkable kindness – particularly in baking bread for his neighbours.

At 21, Roman Smejkal, having been first an atheist and then a Buddhist, finally had his questions answered through Adventist missionaries in his home town, and accepted his Creator as Lord. He studied for ministry in the Czech Republic and came to the North England Conference, where he has served in many churches. According to Pastor Llew Edwards, who introduced him, he's aflame

What a jump!

ne Sabbath morning an advert on the back page of a January Messenger arrested my attention - Why not start the year with a free parachute jump? The caption was accompanied by the image of a previous fund-raiser in full flight during a tandem skydive! Is this something I could do? I asked myself. That same week I enquired from ADRA about what it would take for me to be involved in such an event. I then contacted the company who arrange charity skydives for them and booked myself in for Sunday 22 May.

Having been declared fit enough by my GP, I began thinking about the target amount I would like to raise for ADRA by jumping from an aircraft strapped to a strange man! The figure that came to mind was £800. I challenged this figure, thinking it to be too high, but it kept coming back to mind. I concluded that God intended to take me on a journey of faith; and that He wanted me to trust Him on this one.

Once I had decided on a strategy, I calculated that I would need to average donations of £100 per week to reach my target. The first step was to let all my contacts know about the event and I spent one Sunday morning doing just that. I personalised my web page accordingly, waiting for the online sponsorships to pour in. At the end of the day, I had received . . . zero donations! Raising funds was going to be harder than I expected, but I told myself to be patient and give it a week. By the end of that week, as grateful as I was for the donations, I had only raised £15.

Things clearly weren't going according to my plans, and doubts quickly began to set in: 'Maybe the target is unrealistically high,' I questioned. God, however, was about to reveal Himself and *His* plans for this process to me. He then impressed me that if I lowered my target I would be limiting what He could do through me, and for me. This conviction served to lift my faith during those low points in the fund-raising adventure. I knew that for every person who didn't give, God had lined up someone who would. And this was true, even to the point of my receiving donations from people I had not even personally contacted! God is faithful. It was also an opportunity to raise awareness of ADRA, who a number of my sponsors had not heard of before. By the date of my skydive, 8 weeks after registering, over £500 had been received in sponsorship!

So what of the skydive itself? It was an absolutely incredible experience that I can recommend; and what better way than to couple it up with raising funds for charity? Thanks, ADRA, for giving me the opportunity to do this!


Although my fund-raising fell a bit short of my target of £800, I feel that it was all worthwhile. Brecon Camp celebrates 50th anniversary

Warm spring sunshine greeted the 70 or so campers at this year's Brecon Camp, which was held over the bank holiday weekend of 27 to 30 May. The speaker was Pastor Daniel Thompson, originally from Stanborough Park, but now serving the Bournemouth and Winchester churches. Daniel's theme was, 'Experiencing God in the Real World', and in his six talks he pointed out, as did the apostle Paul at the Areopagus in Athens, that God 'is not far from any one of us'. Quoting Hosea 14:7, Daniel explained that we can experience God simply by living in His shadow.

A perfect illustration of this principle is Andy Newell, who started attending the Brecon Camps a few years ago, just to accompany his wife, Liz. However, as Andy himself explains, spending time in the beautiful countryside, in the presence of God and those who believe in Him, he was gradually drawn into the community. At this year's Brecon Camp, immediately after the Sabbath morning service, surrounded by his friends and family, Andy was baptised in the river by Pastor Jeremy Tremeer.

Daniel also spoke about the need to renew and refresh our experience with God. Using a wind-up radio as an illustration he

demonstrated that while some stations are clear and strong, others are full of static and noise. 'Sometimes we don't receive God on the same frequency as we have received Him before,' he said, 'and so we need to retune.'

This retuning has been taking place at our Brecon Camps for fifty years — a fact revealed during the Sabbath service by Ray Morris, who was a young attender at the very first camp in 1966. 'We remember the year because the Severn Bridge had just opened and we crossed it for the first time,' he said. Also present at those early camps were Ray's wife Lyn, and David and Erica Cameron. All testified to the positive influence of Brecon Camp over the years.

Although the camp takes place in Wales it attracts visitors from much further afield, with the majority coming from the South England Conference. This year we were particularly pleased to have a good group from the Cheltenham church, including their pastor, James Shepley, and his family.

Next year's camp will take place, as usual, over the spring bank holiday weekend, from 26 to 29 May 2017. Perhaps you should put it in your diary now.


Croydon Family Seminar



Father's Day at Hackney

While homes across the UK celebrated Father's Day during the weekend of 18 June, Hackney's Sabbath School Director, Maria Vinas, paid her own tribute to fathers, recognising the important role they play both in their homes and in the church. 'A father is a leader and shepherd of the flock; a priest in the home and someone children should admire and look up to for Godly instruction,' said Maria. What started as a little food demonstration in April 2014, as part of an ADRA clothes sale, has now become a full-fledged NEWSTART health expo. The forecast for Sunday 1 May was heavy rain. Instead the Lord answered the prayers of Handsworth members and held the rain in check to enable the launching of a NEWSTART expo. Area 5 Advisory had asked that, collectively, its churches hold a minimum of 7 health expos in the month of May as preparation for the launching of Mission to the Cities in Birmingham. Handsworth opted to be one of the first churches to take up the challenge.

Training was arranged by the Area 5 Health Committee and Handsworth was represented by 14 of the around 90 attendees taking advantage of the event. The volunteers were fired up, and

by 8.30am the stations were being readied for the onslaught of community members who streamed through the doors from 11am. The queues were long as people waited patiently to attend each station and find out their 'health age'.

Some even went home to bring other family members and friends to receive their Health MOT. Advice was on hand at the 'Trust' station for those who wanted to know what to do with the information they had found. The healthy food sold out and the 100 glucose strips provided were not enough to meet the demand. The two health talks (blood pressure and diabetes) were well received, and attendees watched the simple health food demonstration attentively, then left their details so as to receive the simple yegan recipes.

Approximately 100 people left their contact details to receive



more information about how to improve their lifestyle, including 5 people who wanted to know more about prophecy. At 4.15pm the gates had to be closed to the community in order to bring the expo to a close

Volunteers stated that they had not had a break all day, but were exhilarated by the interest shown by the community. Comments such as these were heard: 'A fantastic event. Staff were friendly, sensitive and knowledgeable. Definitely meeting the needs of our community. Thank you and well done!'

The NEWSTART model seems to be working for us over in Area 5 (NEC).

Swaby (1928-2016) d. 13 June. Mrs Leithie Swaby, known affectionately as Dottie', was born

on 26 June 1928 in the parish of St Mary, Jamaica, and was the only child of Hannah Batten. Leithie attended West Indies College, previously known as Mandeville College. It was here that she formulated her Adventist lifestyle while taking courses in Human Physiology and Mathematics. She was also a great cook and was well-renowned for her cooking prowess, which was evident while she attended the

Leithie travelled to the UK on the ship Irpinia and docked in Southampton on 2 October 1956. Prior to training as a nurse, she

and the Home Office, Croydon. Leithie qualified as a State Enrolled Nurse (SEN) in 1966. and the bulk of her work was in the maternity wards where she received many accolades for her work.

Following her decision to be baptised at the New Gallery Centre, London, in the late 1960s, Leithie became part of the Hampstead church, Chalk Farm, when it moved from Regent Street in 1971. She loyally supported this church and was active in various posts and programmes. She particularly liked attending the South England Conference camp meetings and these became her favourite annual break. In fact, she attended the first one and did so annually for more than 20 years!

Singing was an activity that Leithie greatly enjoyed and did so

regularly with the Hampstead church choir, singing the alto part. The choir rendered prestigious performances, which included Handel's Messiah, Stainer's Crucifixion and Maunder's Olivet to Calvary, under the direction of father-andson team, Livingstone and Edison Weekes. Leithie enjoyed a full church life and the friendships it brought her. She also had a good sense of humour. She had good hand skills too, such as knitting, crocheting, and embroidery. She taught her daughters to knit

Sadly, Leithie passed away on 13 June, two days after being admitted to hospital suffering with unsuspected pneumonia.

The funeral of Leithie Swaby took place at Hampstead Church on Thursday 14 July, and it was well attended by many wellwishers. The white coffin with a side carving of the Last Supper was covered with a spray of flowers including pink roses, her favourite. The officiating

ministers were Pastors Stephen McKenzie, the resident minister: Lorance Johnson; Felix McPherson; David Burnett; and Humphrey Walters. There were tributes, poems, songs, pictorial presentations and Scripture readings through which the mourners were able to express their sentiments.

She was interred at the Paddington Old Cemetery in the same plot as her late husband, Rufus Swaby. She is survived by four daughters: Sonia, Janice, Jennifer and Christine; one son-in-law, Jimmy; along with five grandchildren: Danielle. Jasmine, Seán, Ciarán, and Catriona. The Swaby family would like to extend their thanks to all who have supported the family at this sad time, and for the friends and family who attended the funeral. We look forward with the great hope, with the promise that the dead in Christ shall rise to life everlasting.

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
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
