The Fields are Ripe for Harvest

Mission to the Cities

Urbanization is a generalized phenomenon in our century. People are constantly moving from the countryside to cities for job opportunities and a more convenient life. Currently about 50% of the world's population are living in cities, but this figure could go up to 60% by 2030.

City life is very complicated and highly secularized. People in the cities are becoming more individualistic and self-dependent. Materialism is, in most people's mind, a top priority. People in cities are busily involved in so many activities and appointments every day. Amusement and entertainment businesses are flourishing day and night. Consequently, it seems that less and less people in cities are interested in Christian messages.

However, Jesus says that now is the time to approach the people with the gospel message. "Do you not say, 'Four months more and then the harvest'? I tell you, open your eyes and look at the fields! They are ripe for harvest." (John 4:35)

The pen of inspiration emphasized the importance and urgency of urban ministry.

"The burden of the needs of our cities has rested so heavily upon me that it has sometimes seemed that I should die. May the Lord give wisdom to our brethren, that they may know how to carry forward the work in harmony with the will of the Lord...The cities must be worked. The millions living in these congested centers are to hear the third angel's message." (Ev, 34-35)

The city evangelism faces many challenges. It is not easy to capture the attention of the people with religious messages, because they are more interested in making money and social pleasure through the internet and entertainment events and programs. Although they know

it is needed, some church leaders are reluctant to plant new churches in cities because of the enormous cost of meeting places. It is true that urban evangelism has been neglected for many years due to many reasons and excuses.

In the recent city-wide evangelism in Ulaanbaatar, Mongolia, we witnessed the graduation ceremony of 246 people who had finished the Voice of Prophecy correspondence courses and a baptismal rite of 103 precious souls.

The pastors and church members have worked together with support from the NSD and MMF leaders to bring people to Christ. At the end of the evangelistic campaign they were confident that public evangelism in a large city still works, and is productive.

Nineveh was a large capital city in ancient Assyria with more than 120,000 people living there. It was a wicked city like many other cities such as Sodom and Gomorrah. Their cup of wickedness was overflowing and they were waiting for divine judgment. But God did not give them up. He sent Jonah as his messenger to the city, in spite of Jonah's reluctance to go. What was the result of 40 days of large city evangelism in Nineveh?

"The Ninevites believed God. They declared a fast, and all of them, from the greatest to the least, put on sackcloth. When the news reached the king of Nineveh, he rose from his throne, took off his royal robes, covered himself with sackcloth and sat down in the dust." (Jonah 3:5-6)

We will pray and work together to spread the message of the soon coming of Christ to multi-millions of people in large cities. The fields are indeed ripe for harvest.

The Possibility of Success of the Big City Evangelism Project The Combined Evangelistic Meeting in Ulaanbaatar

Ulaanbaatar Has Been Chosen as a Prelude to the Big City Evangelism Project

Mongolia! The meaning of Mongolia's name is "courage." This has been seen throughout Mongolia's great history, since Genghis Kahn conquered empires and built up an even greater empire in the early 13th century. This country has the 19th largest land mass in the world, and its population is about three million. Approximately half of the population is concentrated in Ulaanbaatar, which is the capital city. 90% of the nation believes in Buddhism, so Christianity is not very strong here. Since the Communists seized power in 1921, a communistic ideology, and atheism have run rampant in its society. All other religions were forbidden for 70 years.

However, religious freedom was finally allowed in 1990, and the Seventh-day Adventist Church first set foot in this country in 1992. Celebrating the 20th Anniversary of the Adventist church beginning its work

in Mongolia, the Northern Asia-Pacific Division (NSD) chose the city of Ulaanbaatar as a pilot area for the Big City Evangelism Project.

They held a week-long evangelistic series in order to swiftly convey the Gospel in this area, and to have revival and reformation in the churches there.

Adventist members who were drenched in the blood of Jesus Christ on the Cross united their minds together to lift the flag of salvation in Ulaanbaatar, whose name literally means "a Red Hero."

The success of the Big City Evangelistic Meeting in Ulaanbaatar is very meaningful, and an encouraging event in mission work. It helps to show the urgent need and effectiveness of the project which will also be held in New York, Tokyo and other big cities of the world in 2013.

A Meeting Prepared through Prayer and God's Response in a Plentiful Harvest

There was a big evangelistic meeting held by the NSD, and the Mongolia Mission Field (MMF) from September 15 to 23, 2012. Different meetings took place at ten churches located near the capital city during the first five days.

All the churches members, who totaled approximately 850 people, gathered together at the UB Palace for United Evangelistic Meetings from September 20 to 23, 2012.

Many church leaders, evangelists, and volunteer workers participated in this special event. They included Dr. Jairyong Lee, NSD President; Dr. SiYoung Kim, NSD Pioneer Mission Movement (PMM) Coordinator; Pastor KwangEui Hong, NSD Mission Training Center Director; Pastor NakHyung Kim, NSD Youth Director; Pastor SukHee Han, NSD HisHands Coordinator; Pastor SeongJun Byun, NSD Communication

Associate Director; Pastor Elbert Kuhn, MMF Director. There were also lay volunteers from Korea, Mongolian pastors, Mongolian church members, HisHands missionaries, Descendants and Golden Angels.

During the first five days, the HisHands missionaries in Mongolia had training sessions at the Ulaanbaatar Central Church in the morning, and preached the Gospel, visiting every house in the assigned area. It was good for them to have quality training by Pastor KwangEui Hong, Pastor SukHee Han, and Pastor ChoonSan Yang from China.

The HisHands missionaries were filled with the Holy Spirit through the Word, prayer, praise, and fellowship, as they went out to distribute tracts and proclaim Christ before many people.

Many who were interested, and young people, attended various activities including Korean culture,

health seminars, Gospel singing, and cooking classes held by Korean evangelists in each church. Those who were attracted by the activities also attended the evangelistic series.

Pastor SiYoung Kim, Pastor KwangEui Hong, Pastor NakHyung Kim, Pastor SukHee Han, Pastor SeongJun Byun, and Pastor ChoonSan Yang were speakers in each church, with Mongolian pastors serving as translators.

The United Evangelism Meeting at the UB Palace was packed with more than 850 people. Dr. Jairyong Lee preached the word of salvation, and participants received showers of grace through his sermon.

On the last day, there was a graduation for 246 Bible seekers who completed a Bible study course through the Voice of Prophecy Correspondence School. Also,

there was a baptismal ceremony for 103 precious people who accepted Christ as their personal Savior on Sabbath afternoon. The NSD leaders and ordained Mongolian ministers baptized the candidates, helping them to become born again sons and daughters of God. At the same time, three people in the Erdenet Church and 30 people in the Maranatha Church were baptized. There were also 25 souls who were baptized during the summer camp meeting in July, totaling 161 people who were born again through the event. It is the largest number of baptisms in Mongolian Adventist history. New members decided to devote their lives to God by delivering the Three Angels' Message to the world.

In addition, the MMF experienced spiritual revival and all the church members were reminded of the Gospel work to be done to hasten the Second Coming of Christ.

The NSD and the MMF shared ideas and made a detailed plan for the Ulaanbaatar United Evangelism Meeting about a year ago. Ten churches in the city of Ulaanbaatar joined the project, and divided the city into 10 areas. The committed members of the churches received HisHands training, and were then appointed as missionaries.

The HisHands missionaries, along with other church members, distributed tracts and booklets of “Present Truth,” seeking interests through house-to-house visitation in pairs. They also helped those interested enroll in the Bible correspondence school, as well as study the Bible with them. Each church started working

on full-scale activities by appointing two ground workers, two months before the event.

They also adjusted the schedule of the overseas evangelistic teams for the period. It was the first goal of the MMF, since Pastor Elbert Kuhn and Cleidi Kuhn began their new post in Mongolia, so that all churches, organizations, and volunteers could efficiently focus on the Big City Evangelist Project. It also created a synergy effect that large missionary organizations such as Global Mission Project, Pioneer Mission Movement (PMM), HisHands Mission Movement (HHMM), and the 1000 Missionary Movement (1000MM) could be tested in Ulaanbaatar.

HisHands Helping Evangelistic Meeting in Local Churches: the NSD Leaders, HisHands Missionaries, Korean Lay Missionary Teams, Golden Angels, and Descendants

The week looked like a missionary festival. 130 HisHands missionaries came from all over Mongolia to

gather at the Ulaanbaatar Central Church for a morning devotional, and prayer meeting. In the afternoon,

they were sent to local churches for house visitation. Each church provided well-prepared programs in the morning and afternoon, and held an evangelistic meeting at 6 pm.

The NSD encouraged overseas volunteer missionary teams in Korea to participate in the Ulaanbaatar evangelism.

Six from the Korean Adventist Women's Association (KAWA) of the Korean Union Conference (KUC), eight from the KAWA of the West Central Korean Conference (WCKC), five from the KAWA of the East Central Korean Conference (ECKC), three from the KAWA of the South East Korean Conference (SEKC), 18 from lay literature evangelists, and the Singapore Overseas Mission Team came to Mongolia to serve at the meeting at their own expense. In close cooperation with the NSD and the MMF, they prepared and implemented gripping programs that met the needs of each church.

The KUC KAWA members met many souls by operating three programs: teaching the Korean language, health classes, and cooking classes at the Maranatha Church.

The WCKC KAWA members invited people to the Khanuul Church through a traditional Korean culture program. More than 80 people attended the Korean vegetarian cooking class held at the Ulaanbaatar Central Church by the ECKC KAWA members.

The SEKC KAWA members supported the meeting through a healthy food class at the Tolgoit Church. Ten literature evangelists distributed 50,000 tracts and supported the evangelistic meeting at the Amgalan Church and the Immanuel Church.

The Golden Angels, singing missionaries of the NSD, participated in a Keep-Fit class at the Amazing Church and Youth Alive program at schools with their music early in the morning.

In the afternoon, they invited many young people to

a language class and club activities. The Descendants, the Mongolian singing group, held a music class to meet people, and teach them about the Bible.

It was a special spiritual experience that the HisHands missionaries, the overseas missionary teams and the

singing missionaries worked together for good. The five day evangelism schedule at each church consisted of sowing seeds during the day and gathering the crops at night. There were many people that decided to be baptized, one after another.

The final united evangelistic meeting was held at the UB Palace on September 20, 2012. It was advertised through TV commercials, banner ads, and posters. Many of those interested had attended meetings held at local churches. There were also many church members gathered at the UB Palace, helping to fill over 1,000 seats.

Recently, the Adventist church in Ulaanbaatar showed a significant decline in their average attendance because many members fell back because of the influence of secularism and urbanization.

For this reason, the United Evangelistic Meeting was

planned to help find lost members and seekers, and to help them establish a personal faith, as well as for the church to experience growth.

They will also have an opportunity to systematically study the Bible through a Bible correspondence program.

Powerful and interesting Gospel messages that moved and inspired the audience were shared by Dr. Jairyong Lee, the NSD President.

There was a severe traffic jam because of road repairs in Ulaanbaatar, but the UB Palace was filled through the power of the Gospel.

Highlight of the Event: Baptismal Ceremony and Voice of Prophecy Graduation

On September 22, 2012, the last day of the evangelistic project, 103 precious souls received baptism and became Adventists. It was even more meaningful because 70% of the baptismal candidates studied the Bible with HisHands missionaries before the meeting. Baptismal

candidates confessed their faith, standing with candles around the tub. At the same time, three people in the Erdenet Church and 30 people in the Maranatha Church were baptized, adding to the 25 souls who were baptized during the summer camp meeting in July. There were a total of 161 people who were born again through the event.

Besides the great news of the baptisms, the Mongolian HisHands translated and published textbooks for the Bible Correspondence School in 2011 for Bible study. HisHands also adopted the Bible Correspondence Schools method of operation.

In addition, the Mongolian Church Pastors and leaders hard work paid off because 246 Bible seekers received a certificate of completion and pin of graduation as they completed the correspondence course.

50,000 Tracts Distributed

50,000 tracts of the “Present Truth” were printed in Korea and were distributed by Korean literature evangelists and the Mongolian HisHands during the Evangelistic Project. As Mongolian people do not throw away even a small piece of paper, we hope this small tract can be a light of the Gospel to each family. The largest numbers of tracts in the Mongolian Adventist history were shared and now the MMF is developing many plans to reinforce their publishing ministries.

The HisHands Mission Movement in Mongolia has trained approximately 430 missionaries in the last four years. This number is actually almost 30% of the Mongolian Adventist members.

While they focused on education and training in 2010, actual evangelistic activities have taken place since 2011.

120 evangelistic agents organized in 2012 and supported the evangelistic meetings of each church in

September, through house visitation and Bible study. The missionaries made a vow during the HisHands training held in April, 2012, to lead at least one soul to the Lord by September.

As a result, 63 people who studied the Bible with HisHands decided to be baptized and were invited to the meeting. 186 Bible Correspondence School graduates were lead by HisHands.

Follow-ups for the Greater Goal, Growth, and Revival

The Ulaanbaatar evangelism was a blessing to many souls because they heard the Gospel. It was also a turning point in restoring church growth from stagnation, motivating the local churches to spontaneously do evangelistic work by themselves. The MMF will continue to raise and train HisHands missionaries to secure new members and Bible Correspondence School students. The MMF Youth Ministries Department is preparing a fellowship program in October and a Bible Olympiad and music contest in November. Those events will assist new members in being familiar with the Adventist church. Here are the impressions of Dr. Jairyong Lee, (a main speaker of the meeting), Dr. SiYoung Kim, (a coordinator of the meeting), and Pastor Elbert Kuhn, (a director for the Ulaanbaatar area).

The NSD President, Dr. Jairyong Lee said, “The Ulaanbaatar city-wide evangelism was a historical event which revived our churches in Mongolia through great mission activities. I hope and pray that our churches in Mongolia will perform even greater mission outreach to other areas, and to achieve great goals. This UB evangelism was a preparatory event for the “Mission to the

Cities,” which will be held in Tokyo next year, and it was a great success. Because of this success, we strongly believe that Tokyo 13 will also be very successful next year.

Pastor Elbert Kuhn, the MMF Director said, “I had been appointed as the new MMF Director this year and I had heard of the Ulaanbaatar evangelistic meeting at the NSD Mid-year Committee in May. It was a big burden because I needed to transfer duties and visit fields first, but I realized that it was a blessing God had given to Mongolia. Although there were some weak points, it was still encouraging that spiritual revival began in Ulaanbaatar. It was God’s tremendous blessing to Mongolia.”

Dr. SiYoung Kim said, “It was a meeting that the Holy Spirit was powerfully present at, because we applied Jesus’ way of evangelism. The hearts of the Division leaders, Mongolian pastors, lay people, HisHands missionaries, and Korean volunteers were mingled. Their devotion and unity brought about a valuable result. I hope the work of the Holy Spirit will continue in Mongolia and also spread all over the world, as well as the NSD territories.”

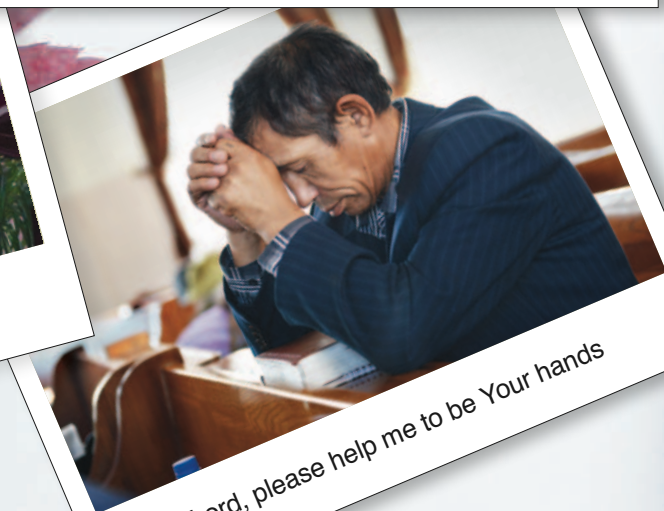

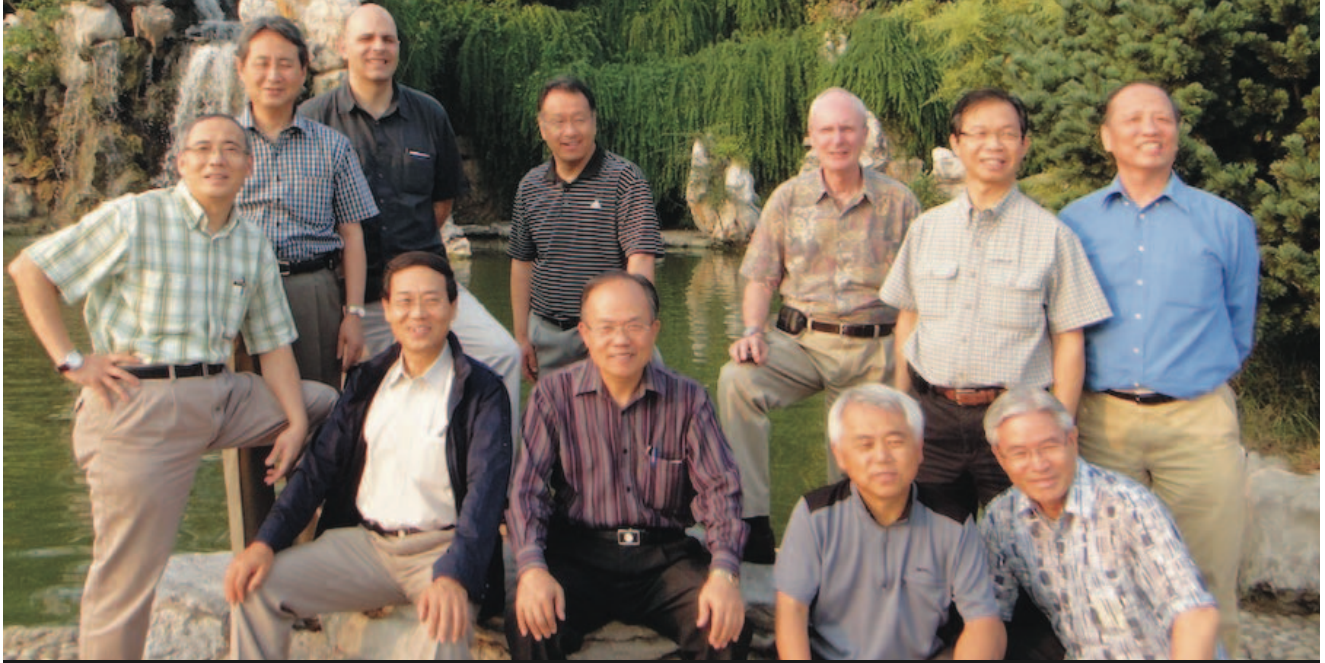

2012 NSD PREXAD Meets in China



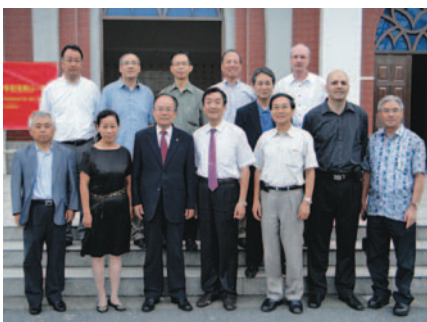

The participants listened to reports on the challenges, and the opportunities from the Unions and MMF. They also brainstormed about future potential plans and development for the enhancement of the work in the NSD territory.

in comparison to previous years. The church leaders not only spent time talking about business, but spent substantial time traveling, visiting some of the churches in more than five cities in China, including Shanghai, Hangzhou, Yixing, Wuxi and Nanjing.

To most of the participants, this was an eye-opening experience. They witnessed how the Seventh-day Adventist Churches in China have gone through such difficult times all these years without any assistance from the outside world.

Yet, because of the spirit of sacrifice and dedication, along with the passion for evangelism from the church members, we can see how the Holy Spirit has been working among His people. The churches in these big cities have been growing very rapidly.

The delegation was met with a warm and cordial welcome by the local church members. Dr. Jairyong

Lee, the President of the NSD said, “I really want to thank God for your spirit of sacrifice and your passion to spread the last day Adventist message to your community.

That is the very reason why God has chosen us as His special people, because we are the people of His Mission.” Dr. Lee led the delegation, and preached two Sabbath sermons which were filled with words of encouragement to our Adventist believers in China.

According to the statistics, there are more than 400,000 Seventh-day Adventist believers now worshipping in China within more than 4,000 churches and meeting places.

The General Conference (GC) Communication Department held a Global Media/Communication Summit at the GC headquarters from September 26 to October 1, 2012. 80 Adventist media professionals and Division Communication directors had an inspiring time through lectures and discussion.

The summit presented a vision for new media ministries to participants through beneficial lectures on vision for media collaboration, church branding, understanding media ministries, and social media evangelism. There were also various group discussions and presentations about global media teamwork, risk

management, communication, lay participation, video conferencing, and mobile technology. The summit went beyond merely having lectures and discussion. A proposal with outstanding ideas from the summit was created for actual implementation.

A group of Seventh-day Adventist media professionals recommended a greater focus on strategic planning for more effectively conducting mission, first with a worldwide communication audit and later forming a committee to organize global initiatives. They said the goals and mission will lay a foundation for greater collaboration and integration of global media ministries. The proposal came out of a five-day global media summit and it will be voted on at this coming GC Annual Council.

The summit, held here at the church's headquarters, was an initiative of the Adventist world church President Ted N. C. Wilson, who said the meeting

underscored unity among professional communicators. "One of the most striking results was the highly spiritual commitment on the part of these world class communicators and media specialists to actually see that the Adventist message gets to every person in the world," Wilson said. "I think that is a tremendous move forward and shows real unity and mission of the church."

Participants also visited the studios of the GC Communication Department and Hope Channel. The producing process of a 24-hour live broadcast and a broadcast network presentation were reported.

Williams Costa Jr., GC Communication Director, said, "The summit helped Adventist media professionals recognize the importance of collaboration and integration in the Gospel work and it resulted in actual and efficient cooperation among them."

Korean Advanced Preparatory Academy Reaches Out to Their Community



Learning English in the special program



Full of energy and passion among students and teachers

“Let’s Play English” is a specialized English program, free of charge to children who are in a low income family, are from a multi-cultural family, and live in the Yongmun-myeon area. The program has been run by Korean Advanced Preparatory Academy(KAPA), an International school in Youngmun-myeon, since April, 2012. Both students and teachers are in the middle of their busy school day, but they are still full of energy and have a strong passion for learning in this very special English class. But, there is a difference between this class at KAPA and a class at other schools. The teachers are in grades 10~12 and are students at KAPA. The only duty for the foreign teachers is to advise them. The whole curriculum for the program is developed by the KAPA students, only needing assistance from the adults in an indirect way. At this time, there are 20 students from the local community who were chosen to participate in this program. Each student takes a level test, and then is categorized as novice, intermediate, or advanced in their understanding of English. In this way they can receive the best English education in the level-differentiated classes. Each class is taught by two to three KAPA student teachers. In the class for beginners, students learn basic English conversations. In both the intermediate and advanced class, they learn about the English words for our body structure, instruments, sports and the world of animals. They also learn English expressions in each subject.

Kim, Ye Rim, one of the teachers in the program, said, “The day is very busy, preparing the quizzes and homework for the students. But I feel really great about how successful this job is. I feel happy when I think of my students who I meet with every Wednesday.” The smile never left her face as she said this. “Let’s Play English” was chosen by the Education Office in Yongmun-myeon, Yangpyeong-gun, as a special education project, and has been welcomed by the local community. It has also drawn the attention of all sorts of press, and interest from the educational world, as well. One of the officials of Yongmun-myeon said, “Thanks to this brilliant program, which is done for free in our community, spreading of our sharing culture will be revitalized, and it will contribute to educational fairness. I think it can improve the quality of our life, and help with budget reductions.”

Kim Hyun Min, who serves KAPA International School as a chaplain, said, We could feel how popular and fabulous this program is. We are going to plan to cooperate with other volunteer organizations in order to maximize our quality of education and also expand the coverage of the application ages. We will make a lot of different programs for them, as well.”

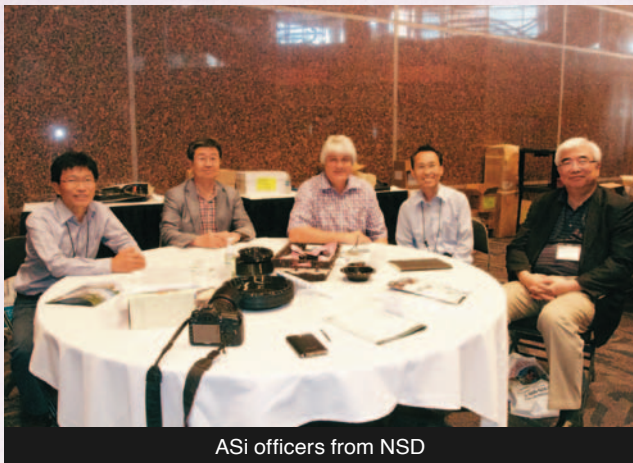

2012 AHCA(Adventist Health Care Association) President's Council Meets in Hangzhou, China



Delegates of AHCA discuss on major issues

The 2012 Northern Asia-Pacific Division (NSD) Presidents' Council of the Adventist Health Care Association (AHCA) was held from September 24 - 27 in Hangzhou, China. 18 hospital administrators, representing 11 member hospitals and one associate member hospital, came from Hong Kong, Japan, Korea, Taiwan and Malaysia to join the Council.



The Presidents' Council is an annual event for the hospital administrators to meet and fellowship with each other for spiritual enrichment, networking and continuing education. The guest speaker at this year's Council, Dr. Gerald R. Winslow, is the Vice President for Mission and Culture for the Loma Linda University (LLU) Medical Center and also serves as the Chief Culture Officer for LLU's system of six hospitals. He is also Professor of Religion at LLU, specializing in Biomedical Ethics.

Dr. Winslow gave two presentations during two morning sessions, "Principles of Faithful Leadership", and "Creating the Corporate Character." Both were very timely and thought-provoking. The presentations encouraged the hospital administrators to become more deeply aware of God's purpose, seeking a

deeper understanding of God's principles for Leadership. He also challenged the administrators with the questions, "What are the effective, practical ways to create a faithful culture for our organizations?", and "What core values fit with our mission?"

Dr. Winslow also shared with the participants the Core Values for the Loma Linda University Medical Center: COMPASSION, INTEGRITY, EXCELLENCE, TEAMWORK and WHOLENESS.

On the afternoon of September 25, the participants went on a tour of Sir Run Run Shaw Hospital (SRRSH) which had signed a cooperative agreement with Loma Linda University about 20 years ago. It has now developed into a 1,200-bed hospital, and is often regarded as one of the best hospitals in both East China and the Zhejiang Province. Decades earlier, Sir Run Run Shaw contacted Neal C. Wilson, the then president of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists, with his dream of building a modern hospital to serve the people of his native Zhejiang Province. Sir Run Run Shaw, and members of his family, had been impressed by the care they had received years before from compassionate Adventist medical pioneers such as Dr. Harry Miller, MD.

Next year the venue for the Presidents' Council will be in Penang, Malaysia.

I was invited along with Golden Angels 8, to hold a series of evangelistic meetings at the Tokuyama Church from May 30 to June 4, 2011 in the West Japan Conference of the Japan Union Conference. By the faithful preparation of the church members, the effort was blessed by a good number of participants, and we, visitors from Korea, were very satisfied with our services during the week in spite of quite busy schedules.

After this event, I returned to Japan permanently. I was again invited by this church to help with the Sabbath School and Church Service on December 10, 2011 and on May 26, 2012. Whenever I visited this church, I was always very impressed by the active work of an older lady. Her name is Mrs. Misao Handa and she is 96 years old. In 2012, she is the head deaconess of a church whose average number of people in attendance on the Sabbath is around 25, including children. When I visited the church, I was so moved by her wonderful voice and her big smile as she greeted everyone as the Sabbath School Superintendent. I was also impressed by her earnest attitude, and wise questions and answers during the Sabbath School lesson hour that I conducted.

Although she was born in Korea before World War II, she moved to Tokuyama, Japan, with the help

of her relatives when she was in the fourth grade of elementary school. Since that time she grew up, married, and stayed in Tokuyama. She had three children with her husband. Though she was already a Sunday Christian, on October 10, 1964 (the opening day of the Tokyo Olympic Games) she was baptized to become a Seventh-day Adventist as a result of visitation by Ms. Takeko Kawahira, a literature evangelist.

Unfortunately her husband died at the age of 78 years old. Her current major prayer is the salvation of her children. Her favorite Bible texts are John 3:16 and 14:1-3. The secret of her young attitude seems to be due to her strong belief in God's love and the soon coming of Jesus Christ. In spite of the fact that she is 27 years older than myself, she wrote to me with her good hand writing as follows: "Pastor, you are also becoming old, please work according to your body condition not working too hard. I hope that you will be able to live with good health until the time of God's call."

When I read this phrase, I was amazed. This phrase is just like the tender conversation from mother to her son, "You are also old enough now, so do not work too much." Is this an evidence of her loving and caring character? 1 John 4:8 says, "He who does not love does not know God, for God is love."(NKJV)

Ilsan English Church's Creative Outreach Ministry

“Northern Asia-Pacific Division territories show a great potential for English speaking church development. One important characteristic of our region is the desire of local people to learn English... English in Asia has become an international language for the arts, science and business.

Based on this innovative idea, the NSD introduced this proposal to West Central Korean Conference for the year 2006 to plan the first English speaking church in Ilsan, Korea” (Proposal for the Development English Churches, 2006, Miguel Luna).

What began with these words on a ministry proposal document has become a church family. This worshipping community is also a center for ministry outreach.

Ilsan English Church meets in NSD’s 7th floor auditorium. There are 30 members on the church books and 60-70 people in attendance for Sabbath morning worship.

Here are ministry reports from this vibrant congregation:

Youth Ministry: “The Youth department of our church is a group of young people committed to learning more about the Lord. They serve the church in as many ways as they can. Participating in the church’s Sabbath School programs is one of them. They also help with lunch preparation and doing dishes after meals. One of their main priorities is meeting on Sabbath afternoon for a Bible study. They schedule other activities that bring them together and provide opportunities for them to invite friends to know Jesus.”

Deaconess Foot Massage Ministry: “Every Sabbath afternoon, foot massage service has been done by four church deaconesses. Church members and guests are welcomed, especially those whose health conditions are not good. One client shared, ‘The foot massage ministry

felt so good, when I recover, I would love to learn and do it for others too!”

English Classes and Bible Studies: “Our free English classes began as an outreach to serve our community. So many people here want to learn how to speak the English language. We also have a Bible study group that meets after each class. We have recently surveyed our students, and asked them how we should improve our classes. Our goal is to advertise in our community again. One student was so excited she said, ‘I will be glad to give my friends a paper about our classes. This is such a good English class, and I love the Bible studies.’”

Sabbath Morning Orchestra: “The Instrumental Orchestra of our church is a group of men and women willing to dedicate their musical talents to the service of God. They practice every Friday afternoon in the children’s room. They fully believe that playing music for the Lord is an act of worship. Through their ministry, church service is spiritually enhanced. They also extend their witness outside the church by inviting guest musicians to play with them.”

Email Newsletter Church Family Connection & Outreach: “The goal of our weekly email newsletter is to communicate with our church family and their family, friends, and neighbors what ministries are available to serve them. Using a simple, cheerful format, we feature reports written by our ministry leaders.” The fruit of church ministry was celebrated in a baptism

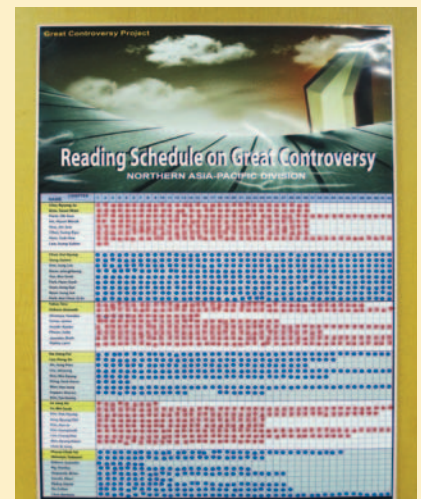

Twice each month during working hours, the Northern Asia-Pacific Division family sets aside special time to experience revival. The In House Revival & Reformation

Committee has led this initiative by providing study materials. For the first part of 2012, the groups used Elder Mark Finley’s book “10 Days in the Upper Room.” For the remainder of 2012, the groups are studying the gospel of John. What is “Revived by His Word?”

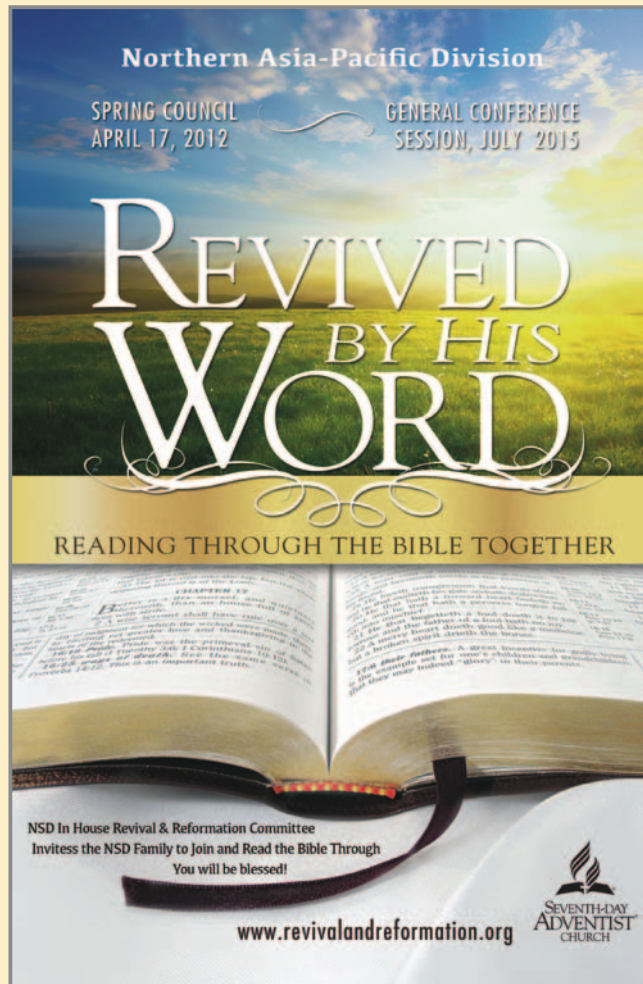

“Teach Us to Pray” – Luke 11:1

“Suppose one of you has a friend, and he goes to him at midnight and says, ‘Friend, lend me three loaves of bread, because a friend of mine on a journey has come to me, and I have nothing to set before him.’ “Then the one inside answers, ‘Don’t bother me. The door is already locked, and my children are with me in bed. I can’t get up and give you anything.’

Ellen G. White mentions many more important conditions of prayers answered in Steps to Christ. When the conditions are met, the promise in Luke 11:9-10 states, “So I say to you: Ask and it will be given to you; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you. For everyone who asks receives; he who seeks finds; and to him who knocks, the door will be opened,” is accomplished.

The conclusion is that God will give us the Holy Spirit, as mentioned in Luke 11:13. “If you then, though you



are evil, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will your Father in heaven give the Holy Spirit to those who ask Him?”

To have us receive the Holy Spirit is the desire of God, our Father. Only if we have received the Holy Spirit can we deliver the Gospel to the whole world through His power.

“A revival of true godliness among us is the greatest and most urgent of all our needs. To seek this should be our first work. Turning Despair into Hope

Long civil war. Widespread corruption. Political confusion and ongoing skirmishes. Ranking on the index of failed states: number 2. Ranking on the global hunger index: number 3. Placement on the world governance index: 178 out of 179. Few places in the world are as plagued with problems as the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC).

In the face of such turmoil, where do you begin trying to make a difference? And can your efforts possibly make any difference at all?

There have been few times when I have been as proud of our world Seventh-day Adventist Church as when I began reporting on the following story. It's easy to be impressed by stories of an individual person's passion for personal outreach, but I venture to say that it's less common to be awestruck by the activities of a group or organization. However, that's what I experienced when several members from the Washington-Spencerville Korean SDA Church, located just a few miles down the road from our office, approached us at Adventist World Radio with an idea for a joint project in the DRC.

A little context would be helpful in understanding how we got to that point. The chain of events came about through a network that stretches halfway around the world, from regional church headquarters in Goyang City, Korea, through the local church in Maryland, USA, to Rafiki Mission in Butembo City, DRC.

The Northern Asia-Pacific Division developed a program called the Pioneer Mission Movement to plant and nurture churches in their territory. In 2009, they began sending missionaries to other divisions, and the DRC was the first location they chose. They felt the strongest approach would be to link individual Korean church congregations as sister churches directly with the North Kivu Field in the DRC. The Washington-Spencerville church was the first to join, and today there are 50 Korean churches involved.

Surprise: the purpose is not financial support. Instead, church leaders want to motivate members to spread the gospel far beyond their own backyards. So every sister church is required to hold public evangelistic meetings at least twice a year and report their mission activities every month. Let me tell you, these people know how to organize, and their processes and results are meticulously documented.

The Korean churches have taken up an array of projects, partnering with various church organizations along the way, and one project has naturally led to another. Amazingly, all of the following projects have been rolled out under the direction of a single missionary couple: Pastor Hyo Su Jung and his wife, Yun Ju Kim.

*** Angels and Children Orphanage** – With support from ADRA Korea and a donor from South America, an orphanage has been established for children who have

been handicapped as a result of malnutrition. Assisted by personal teachers and scholarships, all of the children managed to pass their school exams this year.

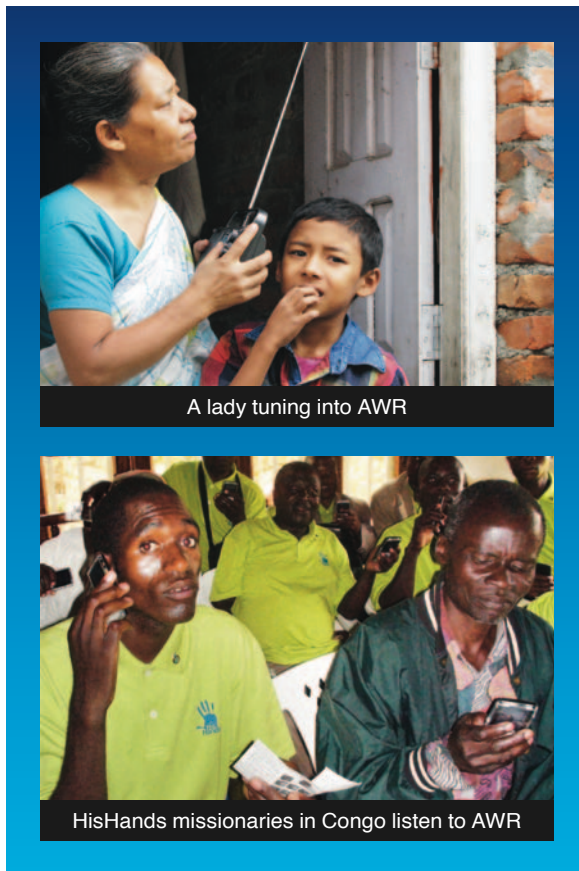
*** Bethlehem Bakery Project** – A for-profit factory is being set up – in the face of sizable challenges – to support the orphanage and other children.

*** Scholarships** – Believing that education is important to young people’s futures, scholarships are being funded for students at every level, from primary school through theology studies at university. At one Adventist academy in Korea, students held a rummage sale to raise funds for a cement floor at a primary school in the DRC.

Another initiative is a sewing school created to teach technical skills.

*** Technical Secondary School** – A dream for the future is to build a technical school to train young missionaries “who have efficiency and spirituality.” Since there is no good school in the area, church members hope that business people and other well-to-do families in the area will also send their children to the school, where they will come in contact with Adventist teachings. Pastor Jung says, “If we achieve this goal, the future of our church will be quite different.”

Without question, sharing the gospel is a top priority. The North Kivu Field has 429 churches and groups but only 45 pastors who are working in the field, so the Korean sister churches are training lay missionaries, providing amplifier systems for public evangelism, sending mission teams for events, supplying Bibles, and arranging youth mission trips. The sister churches are now assigned to support specific lay missionaries, which



will further strengthen their outreach.

This is where AWR came into the picture. The Washington-Spencerville church had heard about special audio players, called MegaVoice Ambassadors, that AWR has been distributing in different parts of the world. The small players are powered by solar panels and come pre-loaded with hours and hours of audio recordings in a selected language. The church thought they would be a perfect tool to provide to the new lay missionaries, so AWR partnered with the church to provide 300 Ambassadors. The players have just arrived in the DRC, where they will be used by the missionaries in

small groups and Bible study meetings. We can’t wait to receive the first reports from these partners in Christ, who are laboring in such a remote part of the world.

At AWR, we love to share stories of single individuals who hear one of our broadcasts and discover God’s love all on their own. This scenario is at the other end of the spectrum: it demonstrates how AWR also works hand-in-hand with other parts of the church to enhance their ministry and together lead people to Jesus through an entirely different chain of events.

Can our efforts make a difference in a tumultuous place like the DRC? These dedicated Korean Adventists certainly believe so, and – through their efforts – confusion, hunger, and failure are being replaced with caring, community, skills, and newfound hope. We are proud to contribute in a small way to their vision.

The Miracle of the Communication & Leadership Advancement Program (CLAP)

CLAP (Communication & Leadership Advancement Program) is a distinctive program initiated at the end of 2008 which addresses the molding of the future leaders in the Northern Asia-Pacific Division (NSD).

As a church, we are not very strong in planning for our second, third and fourth generation leaders in a deliberate way. In most cases, we assume that we just have to pray and everything will fall into place automatically, but that is a fallacy. Leadership training has to be intentional and focus on the specific needs of the particular region. Hence, in NSD the main goal of CLAP is to hone the spiritual leadership potential of our future leaders as well as to equip them

with an essential communication tool—the ability to express themselves clearly in English.

How does CLAP work? Each run consists of four intensive two-week sessions over a period of two years at various locations with 2 sessions in Thailand, 1 in the Philippines, and the final one in Korea. In the time between sessions, participants study and practice their English and are required to submit their assignments to the Division every week on Mondays.

All participants are selected by their local unions, conferences, or missions who also provide partial funding. An English placement test helps us to shortlist the selected participants and to divide the group into two classes for more effective

instruction and learning.

With two complete successful runs behind us, we have much to thank the Lord for. He has certainly worked numerous miracles on our behalf! To be honest, when I first read the initial draft of the proposal for CLAP, my instant reaction was—impossible! Pedagogically unsound! Can it really work? But God had His hand on this plan right from the beginning as He put the pieces together in His own time and way.

The first and biggest challenge was the design of the curriculum. For this significant task, the Lord provided one of the top ESL professors from Newbold College, Mrs. Erica Hole, an expert in the area of teaching English to non-

native speakers. She put together the entire syllabus for the two-year program. Better yet, she came to teach at every session to ensure its success. All who have sat in her classes testify of her unique expertise in drawing out the best in every student, inspiring all to loosen their tongues to speak English.

Since this is a serious attempt to accomplish our goals in a short time, participants speak nothing but English during those four intensive sessions when we meet. Fines are imposed on those who violate this strict rule.

Most of our participants suffer from “lockjaw” when it comes to speaking English. The very first of the four sessions is often the most trying. Some suffer from headaches, stomach upsets or the like because of the stress of expressing themselves only in English. One participant remarked on the third day of the first session, “I can’t believe it! I have spoken more English in 3 days than in the last 10 years combined!” After this initial trauma, however, most find it rather comfortable to let down their guard and bond with new friends among the leaders from every territory in the Northern Asia-Pacific Division.

Another equally important aspect of the program is the leadership component designed primarily by Dr. Chek-Yat Phoon. Many other leaders and Division personnel have added value in teaching different facets of what it means to be a leader. All who have graduated return to their fields with

a clearer understanding of spiritual leadership and the essence of what it means to follow God’s agenda.

Our last session of the second run took place on the beautiful island of Jeju in South Korea, in August, 2012. Although Jeju is well known for its scenic spots, the participants were kept busy in their classrooms learning leadership and English. The day began with morning devotion at 6:00 a.m. that could incorporate a walk to watch



the sunrise, a climb up the road that runs by the beach or a hike through the vegetable farms in the area. Meditation on assigned passages of Scripture gave all a spiritual boost. Classes in leadership and English run throughout the day until the highlight in the evening where Prayer & Friendship Circles (PFCs) meet to discuss their thoughts gleaned from their morning devotion. Members pray for each other, for their families, for themselves and the work entrusted to them. Many have expressed their appreciation for this special time in our schedule and described

it as “uplifting,” “refreshing,” “reviving”.

“Mission” is an important element of every CLAP session. In the Philippines, the CLAP group distributed books, and food to several hundred poor families on Sabbath afternoon. In Thailand, the Division provided funds for the repainting of a Buddhist school in Ayutthaya, in addition to buying some much needed school equipment. Poor students of the Central Philippine Adventist College have been helped with rice provisions, and scholarship funds. CLAP members have generously raised more than US\$6,000 to help these “cottage” students towards graduation. Yes, CLAP is a miracle of our gracious Lord, from its inception, to the planning, and execution of each session. Two successful runs (with 67 graduates) over the last four years have seen His guiding hand in the reviving of a drowning victim, to protecting us from Typhoon Bolaven in Jeju. Yet, I believe the greatest miracle of all is the transformation we see in our participants as they hone their leadership and English skills, and enjoy the camaraderie of fellowship with other leaders in the Division. To God be the honor, and the glory as we prepare for the third run which begins in March, 2013, and will conclude in August, 2014!

Most of the people in Uganda are afraid of water so when they walked

popular material is Home and Health magazine. However, these missionaries must take back the magazine after someone finishes reading it, and then give it to someone else because there is such a shortage of the magazine.

Pastor Han has introduced HisHands activities in other countries and areas in the NSD territories. The HisHands presence in Mongolia has especially

encouraged them. The news that there were approximately 250 Bible correspondence school graduates, and that 160 baptisms resulted from the United Evangelistic Meeting held in Mongolia, renewed the hearts of the Longjing HisHands missionaries with the mission spirit. So much of this wonderful news was because of the work of HisHands missionaries. Then, they can inspire souls they meet and succeed in the mission work."

But now I distribute about 50 a day, or 8,000 to 10,000 a year, simply because there are fewer clients. While I have been sharing about 250,000 tracts for 26 years, I have met many different people such as Protestant church pastors,

Even today as he is starting his car, he is holding tracts for today’s passengers.

They write down every VIP's needs, responses, the topic of conversation they had with them, as well as their prayer requests, on paper. They eagerly pray for them and ask God what they should do for them. They have shown us all the model of how to be a true missionary.

At first, they worried about all the things they had to do, and how many people rejected them.

They were rejected because they are Seventh-day Adventists. However, they found hope and courage through God's guidance, and the many special experiences they had. They said, "The flower shop is our favorite place. The owner

always greets us with a smile, and she is willing to read the message of heaven." They feel as if they share the aroma of Jesus.

Their favorite Bible text is John 14:6 "I am the way, the truth, and the life: no man cometh unto the Father, but by me." They said, "There is nothing more important than telling our eternal truth to people. Our God is the genuine Saviour. We just want people to know that." They are also praying for those who have rejected Jesus today.

Missionary Park said to Chae, "Shall we go on like this for 20 more years?" Chae replied with a smile on his face, "After 20 years, I will be a 90 year-old man. If God lets me evangelize until then, I just might make it." We wish to see their smiles 20 years from now.

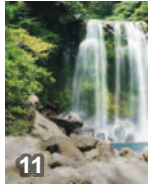
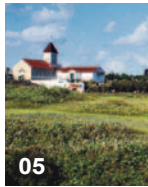
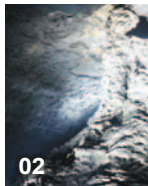
