

pdated images for *Signs of the Times* liteboxes are being installed in various New Zealand airport liteboxes, reports Pastor Desmond Hills—volunteer *Signs* Ministry coordinator for the division—from Esperence, WA, where he and his wife, Ruth, are currently pastoring.

"The new images and magazines are paid for by many generous church members in New Zealand," says Pastor Hills, to whom he passes on his thanks. "Currently we can't keep up with the demand for magazines for any of our liteboxes, including the display racks in the two interisland ferry terminals. Many people want to read our [church's] premium missionary magazine."

Currently 300 Signs go into the Queenstown Airport—"ordered in the faith of donations to come"—with just 25 fully paid for. "Please help me to keep this very strategic outlet available and well stocked," says Pastor Hills.

He estimates that at least 10,000 more *Signs* are needed for *Signs* Ministry Partnership projects division-wide, with many more again for private and local church outlets.

The purpose for students undertaking the program is twofold; some plan to enter tertiary-level courses upon completion. Others are already qualified professionals adding English fluency to their skills.

The formation and implementation of the Avondale English Language Centre is a response to a need for bridging international students into degree programs. It enables Avondale College to offer the "full package" to students with English as a second language. David Potter, the course coordinator, feels "the smaller community, small numbers and friendly environment creates a holistic experience for the students."—Connections

Adventists in Iraq continue to worship

Baghdad, Irag

In spite of heavy bombing Friday night, March 21, and early Saturday morning in a number of cities across Iraq, Seventh-day Adventist Church members met as usual for worship in their church in Baghdad. While there are more than 200 Adventist members in Iraq, most live in Baghdad.

Pastor Michael Porter, president of the Middle East Union (MEU), reports that church members, while unsure of the future, are "of good courage" and that they add their prayers to church members worldwide that God will intervene in the ongoing conflict. Pastor Porter expressed special thanks to the worldwide church for the many prayers ascending on their behalf.

Pastor Porter spoke with one woman who had talked with her sister in Baghdad on Saturday evening by phone. Her sister tried to encourage her, saying, "We're getting used to the bombing and know that God is in control. Don't worry too much about us." Her faith is strong that God will care for their needs even in this most difficult time. Another woman was able to confirm by telephone that her

family in two cities in Iraq are safe.

Following the bombing in the previous Gulf War, one attack on a shelter became especially well known because it has been made into a memorial for the people who died in it. Because of this, church members in Baghdad generally remain in their homes during the aerial attacks for fear that the shelters may become targets of bombing

Office personnel for the MEU, based in Cyprus, include several staff members

whose families presently live in Baghdad. Since the war began, the office family has prayed for God's intervention and protection in this most difficult time at their regular morning worships and again during a special prayer time at noon.

Homer Trecartin, secretary-treasurer for the MEU, says, "We thank God for His protection and for the dozens of emails from around the world, assuring us of prayers on our behalf."—Adventist News Review

Task force to look at conference structure

The Australian Union Conference (AUC) has voted to establish a task force to evaluate the structure of its nine conferences.

"One of our organisational principles is of the strong helping the weak," says AUC president Pastor Chester Stanley. The church has given an appropriation to four of its smaller conferences, and to its secondary boarding school, Lilydale Adventist Academy, this year. "But our smaller conferences still have deficit budgets. Obviously, we need to look carefully at our structure."

A restructure by the South Pacific Division, which reduced the number of its unions from five to four and, in turn.

formed the AUC, is part of the reason for the evaluation, says Pastor Stanley. Before the restructure, the union administering the Northern Australia Conference gave it larger appropriations than the union administering the conferences in South Australia, South New South Wales and Tasmania.

"We need to look at the needs of each conference and make sure funding is more equitable," says Stanley.

The AUC reduced its appropriation to the Northern Australian Conference from \$A260,000 to \$A200,000 this year. It gave \$A140,000 to the South Australian Conference, \$A120,000 to the South New South Wales Conference, \$A115,000 to the Tasmanian Conference and \$A110,000 to the academy.

Pastor Deane Jackson, president of the

Northern Australian Conference—covering northern Queensland, the Northern Territory and the Torres Strait Islands—challenges the decision. He says his conference is one of only two in Australia without a large urban base in which its work is primarily located.

"Our 30 churches and companies are scattered. Half our local church ministers care for three congregations." One congregation, in Gove, is 900 kilometres from Katherine and, according to Pastor Jackson, often only accessible by air. "The nearest pastoral neighbour to our ministers in Alice Springs and in Mount Isa is at least 1000 kilometres away.

"Unlike other large conferences, we do not benefit from our sheer size in terms of membership, captive tithe or the urban drift. Many of our young adults never return to work here."

He says the Northern Australian Conference has made "difficult" decisions, including reducing the level of staffing in its office. "While we recognise there were initial staffing cuts after the restructure, we've since seen increases in the number of staff members at the South Pacific Division and at the Australian Union Conference, with further increases mooted. The needs within a local conference are no less important."

Pastor Stanley agrees, but says despite the restructure and the financial benefits it promised, "there is more work to do."

He expects the task force to present its final report at the AUCs year-end meetings.




