ADRA Appeal results top \$A1 million

WAHROONGA, NEW SOUTH WALES

igures just in indicate that the Adventist Development and Relief Agency (ADRA) Appeal for 2005 raised well over the \$A1.2 million mark, indicating that the doorknock is still very much alive and well. ADRA–Australia is attributing the increase to greater confidence of collectors who go to the doors knowing that ADRA is putting more resources into making its name known to the general public.

Raising a total of \$A1,227,708.91 in 2005, ADRA Appeal results are close to \$A56,000 more than in 2004. Gary Christian, the ADRA director for the appeal, believes

more church people are willing to go to the doors and represent the spirit of Christian volunteering to the public.


Mr Christian says, "We have asked our church people to carry a message about generosity of spirit to the public. We highlighted the benefits and joys of volunteering in our 'Lend a hand' campaign in the media, and church members have embodied the ethic as they have helped us raise funds for our international and national projects."

He adds, "What is also possibly helping is the recognition that the doorknock part (Continued on page 4)

SAH team opens hearts in Fiji

SUVA, FIJI

t has been an annual tradition for the past 14 years and has seen more than 400 people receive lifesaving operations. This year it saw a 50-member team from the Sydney Adventist Hospital head to Fiji to perform free heart surgery as part of "Operation open heart."

The team arrived on June 17 and concluded surgeries on June 30, with around 30 people receiving the operations, which were performed at Suva's Colonial War Memorial Hospital.

The media relations officer for the Ministry of Health, Iliesa Tora, said, "Approximately 100 children and adults from the three main hospitals in Fiji are screened by visiting cardiologists and their local counterparts to decide which cases are to undergo surgery."

From this number, around 30 are chosen to have the surgery. Unfortunately, not all of those who are screened for heart problems are able to receive the surgery.

Some are also too sick to be operated on and Melanie Windus, director of "Operation open heart," says, "Sixteen children were unsuitable for surgery because they were too sick. If they were overseas, because of the availability of the machines and expertise, they would have been saved.

"There is no specialised surgeon in Fiji. That is why we have been travelling to Fiji every year for the past 14 years with the main purpose to help and train local doctors as to what open-heart surgery is all about."

In the past, the teams have trained two doctors in Papua New Guinea for the same purpose, and now these doctors perform the surgeries in PNG and join the teams when they visit the Solomon Islands.

Ms Windus says, "All team members of 'Operation open heart' volunteer their time and contribute financially to this worthwhile cause. Most of us are on leave and have volunteered our time and services to the people of Fiji."

Joe Talemaitoga, secretary of the Fiji Mission, says, "The Adventist Church in Fiji has been a partner in this program each year. Our mothers and members of the Adventist Dorcas welfare society have been providing meals for the team of doctors and nurses each day."

Ms Windus says, "Vinaka vakalevu to all the Dorcas ladies and local churches who have contributed to the success of the openheart team's program."—Cross Roads/Fiji Times/RECORD staff

Socceroos have had their Weet-Bix

hen 26-year-old Australian Socceroo midfielder Tim Cahill scored two of his team's three eleventh-hour goals during their June 12 World Cup match against Japan, the next-morning's newspaper advertisements heralded "Of course he ate his Weet-Bix!" trumpeting Cahill's endorsement of Australia's number one breakfast cereal. Mr Cahill's goals volleyed the Socceroos toward their first World Cup success in only their second finals appearance in 32 years.

Win or lose, Mr Cahill says he is thrilled to help rebound Australia's soccer reputation and to be the new face of Weet-Bix. A sponsorship deal between the Socceroos and Sanitarium Health Food Company (News, April 22) ensures the cereal will be the official breakfast of the team, and Cahill, its face, over the next three years.

"I am proud," Cahill says, "to tell my kids that I am one of the faces in the Weet-Bix advertisements and on over 14 million packs." But his pride comes from well beyond mere publicity, as he starts his day with five Weet-Bix.

Prior to flying out to Germany, Sanitarium hosted a farewell breakfast for the team and anyone wishing to attend, where the team signed autographs and spoke about their World Cup dreams.—ANN/Jaemes Tipple

Sydney church plant to benefit from world offerings

WAHROONGA, NEW SOUTH WALES

he "Fountain in the city" church plant in the centre of Sydney is benefiting from the 2005 General Conference worldwide offering that was directed toward the big cities of the world. Global Mission operations director Homer Trecartin recently announced that of the \$US1.48 million collected for the "Hope for big cities" project last year, the South Pacific Division (SPD) would receive \$US109,194. This will mean an injection of approximately \$A145,000 for the "Fountain in the city" project from the offering.

A previous offering collected in 2004 raised \$A90,647 for the Sydney project. This, together with moneys from Global Mission, the Australian Union Conference and the Greater Sydney Conference has enabled the new church plant in the CBD to proceed, and with two baptisms already conducted the new company is continuing to grow.

Altogether, the SPD raised \$A230,000 from the "Hope for big cities" offerings.

Other cities around the world to benefit from the offerings include: Mexico City, Tokyo, Johannesburg, Buenos Aires, Lon-

don, Bangkok, Montreal, Moscow and Addis Ababa.

"We can be confident that the offerings we give to support the mission of the church are directed to the biggest challenges that we face in fulfilling the gospel commission," says Pastor Ray Coombe, director of Adventist mission for the SPD. "On behalf of the Greater Sydney Conference, thank you for supporting the 'Hope for big cities' offerings. They are certainly making an impact in this, our largest city!"—Ray Coombe/RECORD staff

of the appeal is not as difficult as it once was. The public now is no longer so denominationally focused, and is happy to give to a charity that can demonstrate it is meeting real needs. Recent surveys of donor preferences have also shown doorknocks are far more popular with givers than other types of charity appeals, and perhaps this is showing up in the figures."

There has also been an increase in alternative fundraising methods for those who find it difficult to go on the doorknock.

"A number of churches are using wellorganised walkathons or runathons to raise significant amounts of money," says Mr Christian. "One church in New Zealand has raised as much as \$NZ15,000 during a single event. An increased number of churches are using market stalls to sell items to raise funds for the appeal."

\$A750,000 of ADRA Appeal funds collected in Australia will be used to support international programs, and the remaining \$A478,000 will support ADRA's national program. This means that 39 per cent of ADRA funds are used within Australia, up from the 25 per cent of appeal funds that was designated for homeland programs in the 1990s.—**RECORD staff**



♦ New Start Gardens is a vegetable garden administered jointly by ADRA–New Zealand and the local Adventist community in New Plymouth. The garden is used as a source of fresh garden produce to donate to the community and as a place to give horticultural work experience for those referred from the government employment agency. Currently, 12 paid participants are learning practical

skills—from driving a tractor to chainsaw use. About 80 per cent find jobs after their six-month term. Every week some **50 food parcels** of vegetables harvested from the gardens and bread donated by local businesses are distributed by volunteers to residents of New Plymouth.—*Jenny Rielly*

♦ In a simple ceremony recently the Nunawading Christian



College, Vic, Year 12s received the unique school ties they had designed over the past few months. They are a symbol of their status as the seniors of the college.—Jacques Calais

♦ On April 7, Loma Linda University Medical Center (LLUMC), California, USA, unveiled a state-of-theart mobile telemedicine vehicle (MTV) for disaster and emergency response. The MTV is designed to bring the expertise of a critical-care centre to patients cut off from access to hospital or medical care. Once at the scene, the MTV



can relay medical information, such as X-rays, vital statistics and live video, to LLUMC via a satellite system that isn't dependent on land-based communications. The MTV has a range of 1600 kilometres, can run its generator for up to four days nonstop and houses a smaller all-terrain vehicle inside.—Preston Smith

Evil cannot prevail. Although some wars are just, war is never good and causes great harm. The Bible states there was a just war in heaven (see Revelation 12:7). Look at the great harm it has caused, and is still causing, the earth (see Revelation 12:12).


