Adventists on show at Christian expo

HOMEBUSH BAY, NEW SOUTH WALES

round 200 of copies of the first episode of Adventist Media's *The Code* were handed out at this year's Christian Resources Exhibition (CRE) held at the Sydney Olympic Park in Homebush Bay from July 5 to 7.

The five-part docudrama DVD series was produced as part of a media campaign by the Australian Union Conference (AUC) in response to Dan Brown's novel *The Da Vinci Code*.

Around 20,000 Christians attended the expo. Copies of *The Code* were handed out at the AUC's booth, with the remaining four episodes available for purchase.

"All the DVDs we brought along to give out were taken so we're very pleased," says Pastor Roger Govender, director of the Sabbath School and Personal Ministries Department of the AUC. "We're very proud of the quality of the series."

Other Adventist booths at the CRE included the *Signs of the Times* magazine and Christian Services for the Blind and Hearing Impaired (CSBHI).

Les Relihan, who ran the CSBHI booth, says the booth was very popular this year. "We definitely had more people come through this year than last, which was nice," he says.—*Didier Appave*

SPD president calls for peace in Middle East violence

WAHROONGA, NEW SOUTH WALES

he president of the South Pacific Division (SPD), Pastor Laurie Evans, has expressed concern for all civilians living in Israel and Lebanon in light of the current tension in the Middle East.

"My thoughts are definitely with the innocent who suffer the most during a war," says Pastor Evans. "I am especially concerned for our church members in Israel and Lebanon who are fearing for their safety in their own country."

Pastor Evans is asking church members in the SPD to pray for those in the Middle East who are mourning the loss of their loved ones and currently living in the uncertainty of war. "We need to pray for this war to stop and for peace to become a reality soon," says Pastor Evans. "May God continue to watch over them and give them strength during this time of suffering. May they never lose hope."

Adventist expatriate workers have been evacuated from the area, following advice from consulates and embassies.

In an emergency meeting, Middle East Union church leaders voted July on 17 to postpone the anticipated September relocation of its headquarters to Beirut, Lebanon. The executive committee was called at the current headquarters in Nicosia, Cyprus, where the escalating consequences of the regional conflict were acknowledged.

The situation will be reappraised at the church's year-end executive committee meetings in December to determine whether a move can go ahead early in 2007.

In a written statement, Bertil Wiklander, president of the Trans-European Division, stated, "I share the alarm and

sadness of our church members in Israel and Lebanon, many of whom have had to leave their homes and flee for their lives. We entrust them and all other people who mourn the loss of lives and struggle for their own survival, wherever they may be, into God's hands and pray for their safety and for the war to cease."

Richard Elofer, president of the Israel Field, reported, "The situation in northern Israel continues to be difficult. Many Adventists and Jews celebrated this Sabbath in bomb shelters with frequent interruptions by blaring sirens and explosions of fired rockets."

On July 21 one of these rockets fell on Herzl Street in downtown Haifa, close to three Adventist churches.

"We thank God that none of these churches were damaged and our Adventist families were not struck by human losses," says Pastor Elofer.

As the north of Israel continued to be evacuated, many Adventists and non-Adventists found shelter in buildings owned by the Seventh-day Adventist Church and in church members' homes.

The administration of the church decided to open the Jerusalem Adventist Study Centre for 25 to 30 non-Adventist refugees. Pastor Elofer said, "Even though the church facilities are not equipped to accommodate refugees, we will do our best to provide what these people need."

In closing his report, Pastor Elofer said, "We hope this difficult situation will not last for a long time and that wisdom and responsibilities will prevail among the leaders of the different parties." He also sent thanks to those who remember them with prayers and support.—*Melody Tan/ANN/Adventist Review*

Veteran church leaders take a hike

LAND'S END, ENGLAND

alking 85 kilometres in five days doesn't sound much of an accomplishment if you are young, and if you are hiking along a flat path. But for four "brethren" with almost 170 years of full-time denominational employment tucked under their belts, and a rugged coastal path that crossed streams and contained numerous 50 per cent inclines, some might say, "Didn't the old men do well!"

This adventure was the brainchild of Englishman Dr Bryan Ball, former president of both Avondale College and the South Pacific Division. His goal is to complete the whole of the 1000-kilometre South-West Coastal Path, which runs from Minehead to Poole, over an eight-year period at approximately 120 kilometres each summer

For the latest stretch from Perranporth to Land's End he was aided and abetted by retired Pastors Bob Rodd, Jim Huzzey and John Arthur—all of whom are considerably less experienced in long-distance walking.

The travellers were encouraged by three wives—Moyra, Gill and Ruth—who drove the men to their starting point each day, and then drove to the next cove to join the weary walkers for drinks three or four times each day, and the occasional Cornish cream tea!—John Arthur

LONDON, UNITED KINGDOM

ith a population of between 12 and 14 million people and more than 250 languages spoken, London is a city that is as busy as it is diverse.

London Live is a community of young adults passionately seeking God's purpose and challenging their faith to make a real difference in central London. It is currently being led by a team of five people from, or affiliated with, Australia and New Zealand; Murray and Davina Harvey, Nick and Melissa Thomson, and Ndaba Mazibuko.

"London Live Friday Night Praise and Worship" meets monthly in Oxford Street—the busiest shopping street in Europe and a hub for young adults. The event has contemporary worship, drama, a challenging speaker and a cafe before and after. Australian minister Pastor Grenville Kent was a speaker at a recent worship event. A welcome team invites people in from the street.

"London Live groups" are small groups who meet regularly all around London to learn more about God, the Bible and each

other. They are a great way to build friendships while developing a closer relationship with God.

"London Live careers" is a team of people who have industry experience in career guidance, designated to help people find a suitable career and provide support.


