# School partnership works for Aore

#### COORANBONG, NEW SOUTH WALES

A partnership between two Adventist schools in the South Pacific Division has provided the impetus for a string of fundraising initiatives and valuable resources for a Vanuatu school.

Entering into a "sister school" agreement in 2005, Aore Adventist Academy (Vanuatu) and Avondale School (New South Wales) have created an even closer bond, under the leadership of Aore principal and former Avondale teacher David Rogers in 2007.

In 2007, Avondale students participated in a range of fundraising activities, including a Saturday-night variety concert, weekly car washes and regular mufti days. The funds from these activities will provide a new generator and some computer equipment.

"Aore has been very much blessed by the ongoing support provided by Avondale School," says Mr Rogers. "It is a great example of what sister school assistance can be."

Early in 2007, Avondale assisted Aore with the acquisition of two tractors (one new and one second-hand), vital for the production of food crops at the self-sustaining boarding school.

# PNG hosts Children's Ministries expo

#### LAE, PAPUA NEW GUINEA

ore than 400 Seventh-day Adventist children's ministries leaders from Papua New Guinea (PNG) have been trained and equipped to disciple, inspire and involve children in church life.

The leaders were attending a children's ministries expo organised by the Papua New Guinea Union Mission (PNGUM) and supported by the South Pacific Division (SPD). The last expo in the region took place more than five years ago.

Held in October, 14 presenters from both the PNGUM and the SPD shared experience, information and resources with delegates in 168 workshops over a period of six days. Delegates learned about children's spiritual development, worship, health and evangelism.

"Our aim was to help leaders see that they have a responsibility to lead children to Christ, make them feel valued and help them realise they play an important part in the church," says Judith Nagamisovo, children's ministries director for PNGUM.

Pastor John Kembu composed an original song, bearing the title of the theme of the expo, "Tell a child, tell the world," while Pastor Matupit Darius, communication director for PNGUM, wrote a poem.

"It was wonderful to see mission directors, local church leaders and lay people who have a passion for children attend the expo," says Ms Litiana Qiosese, associate children's ministries director for the SPD.

There are plans to organise similar training events at local missions throughout PNG. "This will create more opportunities for participation with less cost, as the training will be conducted much closer to where

people are," says Ms Nagamisovo.

Nine Adventist children's ministries leaders also received awards in recognition of their "outstanding service and commitment to the spiritual development of children in PNG."

The recipients included those who have served in the children's ministries department in local missions for more than 10 years and those retiring from the job.

"We also gave awards to coordinators who served in the provincial level of their local missions," says Ms Nagamisovo. "We wanted to show our appreciation to these recipients, most of whom are volunteers. They have gone out of their way to serve in the ministry and have made a lot of sacrifices."

The nine recipients of the award were: Anne Raunga, Merilyn Andon Mareba and Elizabeth Jambby, all of New Ireland Province; Dorcas Wakit of East New Britain Province; Clare Ori of West New Britain Province; Aidah Aturoro and Rebeccah Parangki of Manus Province; Joan Bubu Evei of Eastern Highlands Province; and Maye Porter, who is credited as the one who started children's ministries in PNG. —*Melody Tan* 

# New Chinese church planted in NZ

#### PAKURANGA, NEW ZEALAND

new church has been planted among the Chinese community in Auckland. The "Chinese Fellowship Group" met to worship together for the first time at the Pakuranga Community Hall at the beginning of August last year. A total of 65 members and friends attended the morning program, where Pastor Philip Ko preached on "Jehovah Nissi." More than 30 people remained behind afterward for Bible studies.

Although the group is relatively young, they conducted evangelistic outreach seminars in September and October, with people responding positively to them. Pastor Ko also plans to conduct live radio broadcasts on the local Mandarin radio station.

The group is looking to establish themselves officially as a church with their own building but are currently working on planting other worship groups in the Auckland area, which has a Chinese population of more than 100,000.

The group is a result of six Chinese people being baptised into the Glen Innes church in 2000. The number of Chinese members attending grew to 47, as many people made contact with the church via English language classes run by a church elder, Robin Greenfield.

With the growth, the group integrated into the worship service, as well as working on conducting outreach seminars presented by Mandarin-speaking ministers.

Pastor Ko and his family arrived in early 2007, and the group decided it was time to make their vision a reality by forming the Auckland Chinese Adventist church, which would serve the Howick and Pakuranga area.

The group quickly secured the use of the community hall, as well as equipment for services, with strong support from the Glen Innes church members.—*Willie Wu*

# School partnership works for Aore

After Aore's old standby generator broke down in 2006, the school was in serious need of a backup power supply.

The fundraising efforts by students at Avondale have secured a new generator, which is due to be shipped to Vanuatu early this year.

With an increasing demand for information technology experience, Aore has been struggling with limited computer resources. Their computer room houses nine computers, clearly insufficient with classes ranging from 25 to 35 students. Again, Avondale offered its support and secured a number of desktop and laptop computers from Sanitarium Health Foods, which will be shipped to both Aore and Epauto Adventist School in Port Vila, Vanuatu.

"After suffering an earthquake and some serious breakdowns, Aore staff members have been working hard to restore systems and provide a quality education for their students," says Mr Rogers. "The support offered by Avondale School has provided resources that would have been unattainable otherwise."

However, he notes that Aore is not a unique case, "Mission schools are still running all over the Pacific and still have real needs. Support them when and where you can, and continue to pray for us." —David Rogers/Braden Blyde

## Australia Day at church




