Choose to Reinvent Yourself in 2011

A little boy posed this riddle to his father. "Three frogs are sitting on a low-hanging branch over a pond. One decides to jump into the water. How many are left?"

The father smiled and said, "That's easy. Two."

"OK. Well, then the others must have jumped, too. So, none

are left."

The boy grinned. "Nope. There are three, because the first frog only decided to jump but never did."

This is the time of year when many of us make resolutions. But as I review mine through the years, I'm disappointed that many didn't survive past January. So, this year I'm using three guiding questions for making better resolutions and taking the leap.

First question: Is this is an authentic resolution? A resolution is the firm resolve to take action, whereas an "irresolution" lacks resolve and is filled with wavering and hesitation. Many of my resolutions have been wavering "irresolutions."

But there are reasons why peo-

ple waver. Behavioral change experts say that change is a multistage process. They recommend we determine where we are in the process to know if we're ready for action. So, question two is: Am I really ready for change? Here is the "CliffsNotes" version of how these stages work:

Pre-contemplation to Contemplation: Self-aware-ness. I start becoming aware of change. It can happen through information and personal feedback. I begin realizing how my unhealthy behavior affects others, and the positive effects of

Contemplation to Action: Self-evaluation. I realize this change is an important part of who I want to be. I find myself saying things like, "I want to be like that."

Preparation to Action: Self-liberation. I begin to believe in my ability to make a change and in making the necessary commitment to act on that belief. This is where I start saying things like, "I can do this!"

Action to Maintenance: Permanence. I establish the new change and reinforce it by rewarding myself; find people who support my change; continue substituting healthy ways of acting and thinking for unhealthy ways; and use stimulus control and triggers to support and encourage the new habit.

If I make a resolution that is in the action stage but I'm in the contemplation or preparation stages, then chances are I won't keep it. (For further information on this topic, consider Prochaska's book, Changing for Good).

Lastly, question three: Am I making too many resolutions? It's far better for me to focus on two or three important changes than overwhelming myself with 15 or 20.

If you were to make two or three major resolutions this year, what would they be? In which area(s) of your life do you hear yourself saying, "I can do this!"?

Let's consider the eight universal principles of CREATION Health (choice, rest, environment, activity, trust in divine power, interpersonal relationships, outlook, and nutrition). Is there one area that, if changed, would dramatically improve your life? If so, which one? Most importantly, where in your life do you hear God whispering, "We can do this!"?

God has blessed you with the gift of choice. So choose to reinvent yourself in 2011. Take the leap! And when you do, you'll find yourself landing in the caring arms of a loving heavenly Father with whom nothing is impossible.

Faded Glory

I listened to an exchange between a young man in his late teens and a gentleman in his late 70s. The young man had just returned from a mission trip to Mexico and was excited to share all that had taken place. The older man listened but was obviously unimpressed.

"Well, that's not too bad, but when I was your age we were really on fire for God. We didn't have the shallow experience with God that is so characteristic of this younger generation today. Back then there was nothing we wouldn't do for God. Not just some mission trip, but every day!"

The young man grew silent as the joy drained from his face. The older man continued, but neither the young man nor I were listening. I can't tell you what the teenager was thinking about, but thoughts of Sardis came to my mind.

You remember the church of Sardis from Revelation 3, don't you? Sardis had once been a vibrant and prosperous city, but by the time John wrote Revelation, the glory days were over. Sardis was a city in decline. The problem was that the residents of Sardis ignored the present reality and thought of their city as still being strong and prosperous.

Sardis was built at the top of a very steep hill. The slope of the hill was so steep that it would be difficult for an invading army to climb the slope and then be able to get over Sardis' impressive walls. The leaders of the city placed a lot of confidence in that natural barrier to invasion. So much confidence, in fact, that on two separate occasions they had failed to post guards on the walls, making it easy for the invading army to capture the city with hardly a fight.

Sardis was a city that lived on past glory, a glory now faded. She had a false sense of security and failed to keep watch.

"And to the angel of the church in Sardis write, "These things says He who has the seven Spirits of God and the seven stars: "I know your works, that you have a name that

you are alive, but you are dead. Be watchful, and strengthen the things which remain, that are ready to die, for I have not found your works perfect before God,"'" (Rev. 3:1, 2, NKJV).

Living on past glories is deadly. Those who live in the past are spiritual zombies!

While it is never a bad thing to remind yourself of God's leading in your past history, we cannot live on past glories. The past is important in that it gives us confidence for today. The Holy Spirit is alive and active now. Just as Jesus pled with the church at Sardis to wake up, so too does He call us to leave the past in the past and experience a fresh dose of the Spirit today.

There are those who speak only of the past. Every event in life provides an opportunity to share with all who will listen just how good it was yesterday and how bad it is today.

The reason some people speak so often of the past is that nothing is happening in their experience today! Those who are active and alive with Jesus today don't have time to dwell on past glories. They are too busy with the movement of the Spirit today!

But there is good news for those who tend to live on past glories.

"He who overcomes shall be clothed in white garments, and I will not blot out his name from the Book of Life; but I will confess his name before My Father and before His angels," (Rev. 3:5).

You can overcome your obsession with past glories and become alive in Christ today! How do we overcome? In Revelation 12:11 we learn that we overcome by "the blood of the Lamb." Spiritual zombies can be made alive again by experiencing afresh the saving blood of Jesus. They must return to the most basic element of the gospel—the joy of our salvation by faith in the sacrifice of Christ, and thus be made alive.

Learn from the past and be encouraged by the past. But don't live as a spiritual zombie. Jesus offers a life that is vibrant and joyous today.

Turn to the cross of Christ. Focus on His sacrifice—His atoning blood. It's time to live again!


Not only has this been a great nurturing tool, but it also has great evangelistic possibilities for those households in which there are people who do not know our message. Many stories have

El Uso De La Tecnología

En Apocalipsis 14:6 Leemos lo siguiente, "Y vi otro ángel volar en medio del cielo, que tenía el evangelio eterno, para predicarlo a los moradores de la tierra, y a toda nación y tribu y lengua y pueblo."

Al pasar el tiempo cambian las culturas, las costumbres y las idiosincrasias, pero el evangelio sigue siendo, "El Evangelio Eterno," no cambia.

En el 2011 seguimos siendo salvos de la misma forma que cuando por primera vez Dios presentó el evangelio, "Las Buenas Noticias", a Adán y Eva en el jardín del Edén. Somos salvos por gracia, por medio de un salvador, Cristo Jesús quien murió en la cruz para pagar por nuestras culpas y para que tengamos esperanza de vida eterna.

Ahora, aunque el evangelio no cambia, la metodología para presentar el evangelio sí cambia. Debemos ajustar la metodología a las diferentes culturas, costumbres e idiosincrasias. Y debemos usar todos los recursos tecnológicos accesibles para alcanzar al mayor número de personas con el evangelio de salvación.

El cuatro de Febrero de 2011 comenzarán más de 100 campañas evangelisticas en Houston, Texas, con el proyecto titulado, "Houston Para Cristo." Este proyecto evangelístico está organizado por la Unión del Suroeste y apoyado por la Conferencia de Texas y La Conferencia Regional. En este proyecto se están uniendo en la predicación del evangelio, administradores de la Unión y de las Conferencias, pastores, evangelístas y laicos. Y creemos que Dios va a bendecir grandemente este esfuerzo unido.

Y por supuesto, si queremos tener una gran cosecha, tenemos que primero sembrar. La naturaleza nos enseña una gran lección, "no podemos cosechar donde no hemos sembrado." Y para promover las campañas, se están usando recursos tecnológicos como el internet, la radio, carteleras en carreteras principales de Houston, y otros medios más. También tenemos un gran número de hermanos y hermanas dedicados y comprometidos en la preparación del territorio para las campañas evangelísticas. Algunos están trabajando en grupos pequeños y otros con estudios bíblicos individuales.

En Septiembre de 2010 lanzamos, en la iglesia Hispana de Houston Spring Branch, un proyecto de entrenamiento laico para equipar, entrenar y motivar a nuestros hermanos en la preparación del territorio. Más de 500 laicos se comprometieron para participar en este proyecto de preparación de territorio. Para esto, se les entregó una serie de estudios bíblicos en DVD. Tenemos la confianza de que al usar esta tecnología, se les facilita presentar el evangelio a otros, y es un método más atractivo e interesante para

los que reciben los estudios bíblicos.

Sin embargo, aunque la tecnología tiene su poder y su alcance, no debemos olvidar que solo el Espíritu Santo tiene el poder de tocar vidas y de cambiar corazones. Esto me recuerda de algo que oí decir al evangelista internacional, Alejandro Bullón, en el año 2000 mientras nos encontrábamos en Cuba, participando del proyecto evangelístico, "Cuba, Cristo Te Ama," donde se dieron más de 100 campañas evangelísticas en toda la isla de Cuba. Alguien le preguntó, "Pastor Bullón, ¿Cuándo va a comenzar a usar la tecnología, como Power Point, para predicar el evangelio? La respuesta de él fue, "Eso es muy complicado para mí." Y prosiguió a decir, "Lo que yo hago, en mis predicaciones evangelísticas, es pasar a dar testimonio a una persona que fue un drogadicto o un alcohólico y le pido que diga cómo fue que Jesús cambió su vida, y ese es mi PowerPoint."

En el libro Testimonios Selectos, tomo 4, página 284, encontramos la siguiente declaración, "Sin la presencia del Espíritu de Dios, ningún corazón se conmoverá, ningún pecador será ganado para Cristo."

¿Debemos usar la tecnología para la evangelización? Sí. Pero no olvidemos que debemos depender más del poder del Espíritu Santo.

CAST YOUR NET

netAdventist offers a new technology for sharing timeless truths

esus told Peter to put away his net so that they could fish for souls. Today a new tool is available for soul winning, and ironically, it involves using using a different type of "net."

Maintaining a current, relevant Web site is one of the most important ways a church can make itself accessible to the local community. To that end, the Southwestern Union is partnering with the General Conference to provide free Web site hosting for

every church entity within the five-state union.

Built on the net-Adventist platform, this free service allows churches, schools, and Adventist entities of any size to create a content-rich Web presence without the typical fees involved in designing, building, and maintaining a Web site.

The netAdventist platform provides a robust toolbox of extensions and widgets that make your Web site valuable to both church members and visitors.

The platform is designed so that a church secretary or lay volunteer can easily maintain and update Web site content without assistance from a programmer or Web designer.

Maintaining an effective church Web site means more than just providing contact and event information. A vibrant, thriving church needs a Web site regularly updated with fresh news and content. A stale, never-changing Web site creates the perception of a stale and possibly dying church. Fresh content keeps Web site

visitors coming back.

A fresh, updated site requires frequent interaction by a volunteer or church staff member. Fortunately, the netAdventist platform provides access to news feeds shared forms, and calendars from trusted sources like the *Adventist Review* and Adventist News Network. These resources update automatically with breaking church-related news and information.


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Another valuable aspect of the netAdventist platform is its multiple access level function. General content can be flagged for unlimited public access. More churchprivate, related content, such as the online or printable church directory or photo albums, can be made visible only to members with usernames passwords.

In addition, content can be made accessible only to designated groups. For example, you

can share an upcoming agenda file with your church board group, or make a staff announcement to your Pathfinder leadership group.

The netAdventist platform also provides evangelistic resources such as online Bible studies, evangelistic series, streaming media players for 3ABN, Hope Channel, and other Adventist television and radio channels, and many other outreach-based resources that can be embedded directly into your church's Web site. This allows you to use your Web site as an outreach tool. Some churches



junction with third-party Web streaming services. Specifically developed for use by the Adventist Church, netAdventist and its code was donated to

the church on an open license basis. Any official Adventist entity can become a license holder and not only access the code but also improve and add to the overall platform. Church programmers from around the globe are continually writing new extensions and widgets to meet specific needs. When approved, these contributions are added to the software platform and made available to the church at large.

One example of such resourceful programming is the Publ'Assist module, which was commissioned by the Pacific Union Conference as a content management system for union magazines. The Southwestern Union recently started using the module for the production of the *Record*. Publ'Assist allows regular contributors to upload stories, photos, and captions directly to the *Record* Web site. The content is edited by *Record* staff and then flowed directly to the designer. Any content changes or updates are automatically updated in the layout. This saves time and makes it easy to publish each issue directly to the Web with the click of a button.

Publ'Assist is available to any Adventist entity that produces content for recurring magazines or newsletters. The Texas Conference, for instance, is exploring the use of this module for its stream to churches with netAdventist Web sites. Local churches can even share news and calendar items, such as concerts or other events.

The Southwestern Union, in cooperation with the five local conferences, leases server space to make this valuable Web site platform available to every church, school, Pathfinder Club and official church entity free of charge. Any church or entity that already has a Web site can easily and inexpensively migrate content to a netAdventist site and continue using the same Web address.

HOUSTON FOR CHRIST

That do you mean by Houston for Christ?" I asked Dr. Duane McKey, vice president for evangelism at the Southwestern Union Conference. As his assistant, I often have the privilege of hearing plans at their early stages and before long, I was told all about the idea of holding simultaneous evangelistic meetings throughout greater Houston. This would be no small challenge, for sure. As far as we know, an evangelistic series of this magnitude has never been done in North America, with so many different speakers all preaching the same message at the same time. We owe a huge "thank you" to the Southwest Region Conference and the Texas Conference for their vision in having these meetings.

There are about 90 churches and church companies in the Houston area between the Southwest Region Conference and the Texas Conference. As we do everything big in Texas, a goal of 100 meetings was set. With the greater Houston area covering about 8,778 square miles, that many meetings means that anyone can literally go within two miles of their home and find an evangelistic

meeting taking place. Our first task was to locate every church and company in both conferences. The next step was to contact

> on board with this evangelistic endeavor. Upon visiting with some of them, we found that their enthusiasm for this project was so great that not only would their churches participate, but many of their members wanted to hold neighborhood evangelistic meetings,

each pastor and ask if they would be

well. Some churches, such as Galena Park and Spring Branch, immediately had a growing list of lay preachers. The first two lay people to register were Ramiro Cortez and Salvador Vazquez from Galena Park. They were with us when we held evangelistic meetings in Veracruz, Mexico, this past March. Their enthusiasm spread quickly among fellow church members, and a total of 12 signed up to preach.

Thanks to the ministry of ShareHim that provides ready-made sermons, lay people with no formal training can preach an entire evangelistic series. Here is where we can see how modern technology is helping to spread the gospel throughout the world. Lay people who have a burning desire to see Jesus come quickly simply install the ShareHim program on a laptop and practice preaching the sermons. A guest at the meetings would never know that the person behind the pulpit is not a formally trained evangelist.

We have a diverse group of people who will dedicate one to two weeks of their lives to preaching God's Word—truck drivers, a college student, secretaries, attorneys, doctors, and housewives, along with our pastors and professional evangelists. We are also blessed to have some of our leaders from the North American Division, such as Dan Jackson, president of the NAD, and some General Conference officials, along with the presidents of the Southwest Region and Texas conferences joining us in Houston to be part of this history-making evangelistic series. Speakers are coming from as far away as Colombia, Mexico, St. Lucia, and Nigeria, and others are coming from places as close as the Rio Grande Valley.

Depending on which church

or home you choose to walk into on February 4, 2011, you may hear your speaker preaching in French, Vietnamese, Korean, Kiswahili, Kihyarwanda, English, or Spanish. The Missouri City Fondren Southwest church will be holding meetings in three different languages at their locations. We will have 81 meetings in churches and 51 meetings in homes or other locations, making a total of 132 meetings.

Technology will also play a big role in letting all of Houston know that God's Word is coming to town. Billboards advertising the series throughout the greater Houston area will be catching motorists' attention and directing them to a special Web site as they travel the freeways of Houston. The site is set up so that anyone can determine which meeting is closest to their home.

I can hear the excitement rising as I have been visiting by telephone with the many pastors and lay people scheduled to preach. Pastor Franklin Nicholas, who pastors both the Emmanuel Temple church in Beaumont and the Mount Olive church in Port Arthur, can hardly contain the excitement in his voice as he shares with me how they are mailing 20,000 handbill invitations and will be passing out 5,000 of them the Sabbath before the meetings begin. His church held an all-night vigil on December 30, 2010 just to pray for those people who will be coming to the meetings in February. They are especially excited that Pastor Patison Preville will be coming in from St. Lucia.

We are keeping my neighbor, Carl Johnston, from Seminars Unlimited in Keene, Tex., extremely busy doing all the advertising for each church and home meeting. His team and ours have

been

working

closely together as advertising deadlines come upon us.

Would you like to also be part of the Houston for Christ series? You can help by setting aside time each day, starting now until the end of February, to pray and ask that the Holy Spirit prepare the hearts of everyone living in Houston who will be passing by a bill-board, or who will be handed an invitation to a meeting. Pray that they will make the choice to attend a meeting and that those who attend will find Christ. If you have friends or relatives in Houston, call and encourage them to visit the church nearest their home. You can even visit the Web site at www.houstonforchrist.org and let your loved ones know about the excitement that is soon to hit Houston.

A Day Of Technological Gospel Opportunity

Under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, the prophet Daniel was told, "But you, Daniel, shut up the words, and seal the book until the time of the end; many shall run to and fro, and knowledge shall increase" (Dan. 12:4). Students of Bible prophecy understand that this reference to "shut up the words, and seal the book" refers to the book of Daniel. For more than two thousand years after it was written, it remained a book of mystery. It was truly a "sealed" book. But in the late 1700s and early 1800s, men and women around the circle of the globe began to study this once closed book and discovered the beautiful truths of end-time events. What would Daniel say about cell phones, the Internet, or high-definition television, if he were living today?

The fact of the matter is that the explosion of knowledge Daniel references is also about an increased knowledge and understanding of the Word of God. Never in the history of the world has there been such clarity of biblical truth. Therefore, the challenge for God's people today is to combine the explosive secular knowledge of mass communication with the clarity of present truth, so that every nation, kindred, tongue, and people have an opportunity to know the truth as it is in Jesus. If ever there was a technological possibility in the history of this world to be able to

fully share the beauty of the gospel message globally, the time is now, and we must be faithful in doing our part.

A Time to Reflect

Here we are at the beginning of another year. It is just an arbitrary mark on the calendar, but it gives us a good opportunity to reflect a where we stand. I'm not talk-

on where we stand. I'm not talking here about reflecting on our social or economic standing, but specifically on our relationship with Christ. It is easy to be deceived in this area. Drawing a lesson from the experience of God's Old Testament church, Paul admonishes the Corinthians, "Therefore let him who thinks he stands take heed lest he fall" (I Cor. 10:12, NKJV). I believe that there are ways to prevent this from happening so that we will not be led astray by false ideas or self-deception.

We need to ask God to make us willing to follow all of the divine counsel that He has made available to us. Most of us like to choose those texts in the Bible and quotations in the Spirit of Prophecy that we like and that appeal to the way that we think. While reading Scripture recently I came to a text that really spoke to my heart. I said, "Thank you, Lord, I really needed that." However, just a few lines later I read another one and said, "Lord, I didn't need that one." By His grace we must surrender our hearts so that we will heed His counsel. We must keep Christ's sacrifice ever in our minds. "The matchless love of God for a world that did not love Him! The thought has a subduing power upon the soul and brings the mind into captivity to the will of God" (Steps to Christ, p. 15).

We need to ask God to make Christ and His cross the center of our lives. "Christ is the source of every right impulse. He is the only one that can implant in the heart enmity against sin. Every desire for truth and purity, every conviction of our own sinfulness, is an evidence that His Spirit is moving upon our hearts" (*Steps to Christ*, p. 26).

We need to ask God to help us not to be satisfied with the experience of the past, but to recognize that sanctification is a lifelong process that never stops. "Brethren, I do not count myself to have apprehended; but one thing I do, forgetting those things which are behind and reaching forward

to those things which are ahead, I press toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus" (Phil. 3:14, NKJV). If the close of another year should find us still on this earth, may it find us victorious and surrendered to God's will and His work.

Here We Grow Again







In the darkness of the night, we walked to our designated area. One of our brothers had taken his vehicle to carry items we needed, so we patiently waited as they made several trips to carry belongings from our broken bus to our camping site. As we prayed for God's protection, one of our brothers, Oscar Hernandez, suffered a near-death experience. As he was taking items out of the bus, our brother backed up the truck, unaware that Oscar was between both vehicles. Esteban Garcia, our director, yelled to Oscar to get out of the

way and simultaneously jumped in to push Oscar out of danger, risking his own life and saving another. God protected them both from what could have been a tragic accident.

Be Faithful, Regardless of Circumstances

In 874 B.C., Ahab became king of Israel. Ahab "did more evil in the eyes of the Lord than any of those [Israel's kings] before him" (1 Kings 16:30, NIV). Because of the sinfulness of Ahab and Israel, Elijah, God's faithful minister and prophet, pronounced the following judgment: "As the Lord, the God of Israel lives, there will be neither dew nor rain in the next few years except at my word" (I Kings 17:1, NIV). Elijah delivered an unpopular message in hostile circumstances. "God always has men to whom He entrusts His message. His Spirit moves upon their hearts and constrains them to speak. Stimulated by holy zeal, and with the divine impulse strong upon them, they enter upon the performance of their duty without coldly calculating the consequences of speaking to the people the word which the Lord has given them. But the servant of God is soon made aware that he has risked something. He finds himself

and his message made the subject of criticism. His manners, his life, his property are all inspected and commented upon. His message is picked to pieces and rejected in the most illiberal and unsanctified spirit, as men in their finite judgment see fit" (*Testimonies to the Church*, vol. 5, p. 299).

"Those who refuse to receive reproof and to be corrected, will manifest enmity, malice, and hatred against the instrument that God has used. They will leave no means untried to cast stigma upon the one who bore to them the message. They will feel as did Ahab toward Elijah, that God's servant is the one who is the hindrance, the curse. Said Ahab, 'Is that you, you troubler of Israel?' " (SDA Bible Commentary, vol. 2, p. 1034).

Ministers today face similar problems. Belief in God and respect for God are declining and therefore, respect for and civility toward His representatives are declining. Let me illustrate. During a youth football game, the quarterback was tackled after he had passed the ball. From the press box, the announcer said, "There is a flag on the field. The penalty is roughing the pastor. . . I mean, roughing the passer."

We live in a world when pastors, like the quarterback, get "roughed up" once in a while. Pastors aren't perfect, but God calls us to honor those who lead, especially "those who labor in preaching and teaching" (I Tim. 5:17, NIV). Pastoral leadership is challenging. Ours is a sophisticated, fast-paced, complex world. Our expectations for pastors are high and at times, beyond reason.

It helps when church members honor pastors with words of encouragement and prayer. Kind words, supportive notes, or "thank yous" will go a long way to stimulate pastors to serve with joy and efficiency. Don't rough your pastor; be a pastor protector. Encourage your ministers to give God's Word with enthusiasm and power and to be faithful, regardless of the circumstances.

English Department Has Reputation For Excellence

Southwestern Adventist University has "one of the best English departments in the Adventist system," according Benjamin McArthur, academic dean. A "recent emigrant" from another Adventist college, McArthur says that he is particularly impressed with the department's effectiveness at teaching writing. "That's central to any college education."

There are five "superbly qualified" teachers in the department, each with a doctoral degree and extensive teaching experience. "They are a distinctive group," says university president Eric Anderson, once an English major himself. "Not a boring or bland teacher in the lot."

There's an outspoken medievalist (who climbs mountains on his holidays) and a British lit specialist who runs the university's Honors Program (and recently learned to speak Italian). There's a popular writing teacher (who is an enthusiastic basketball fan) and a demanding scholar of nineteenth-century America (who is known

than doubled in the past twelve years.

"These people can really teach well and love the classroom," he says of his colleagues. "I think students see that they can get a good education here, and word of our program is spreading."

Students are beginning to see how flexible an English degree can be, he adds. "It prepares students to go into a wide variety of careers, including PR, marketing, editing, journalism, law, medicine, teaching, business, and many others," says Doneskey. "It works that way because the major trains stu-



education." He explains that English will never be "one of our largest majors, like nursing or business." But "all of our graduates should be competent writers."




> lowa, Missouri, Tennessee, and Nebraska. He often conducts family finance seminars.

Mathews replaces Ed Reid, who recently retired. He began his new responsibilities on January 1.





Strategic Plan Adopted for North American Division REACH North America Launched

Revival, reformation, and a renewed emphasis on uniting in love to reclaim missing members and to reach our communities with the gospel was a significant theme during the General Conference Autumn Council and the North American Division Year-end Meeting in late 2010. Presidents Ted N. C. Wilson, GC, and Dan Jackson, NAD, introduced documents that were read and voted and that are intended to impact church life and its mission during the next five years.

President Dan Jackson shares his vision for the North American Division: "I believe that we are living in that segment of time that the Bible writers describe as 'the end of the age.' For Seventh-day Adventists of all generations the resounding

At the autumn meetings, members of both sessions voted overwhelmingly to endorse the following statements:

The challenge of taking the gospel to the world is not new. The disciples faced this challenge in the first century. We face it in the twenty-first century. The New

Testament church was seemingly con-

fronted with an impossible task.

But empowered by the Holy

Spirit, the church exploded

in growth (Acts 2:41; 4:4; 6:7; 9:31).

Christ's Great Commission was accompanied by His great promise. The Savior commanded His disciples "not to depart from Jerusalem, but to wait for the Promise of the Father" (Acts 1:4). The Savior promised, "But you shall receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you shall be witnesses to Me in Jerusalem, and

in

all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth" (Acts 1:8).

The love of Christ controlled every aspect of the lives of the disciples and moved them to a passionate commitment to His service. They sought God for the promised power of the Holy Spirit and knelt before Him in heartfelt confession and earnest repentance.

Too often God's mission of saving a lost world has not taken first place in our hearts. At times, in our busyness, although doing good things, we have neglected the most important thing-knowing Him. There is nothing more important than knowing Jesus, studying His Word, understanding His truth, and seeking His promise for the outpouring of the Holy Spirit in latter-rain power for the fulfilling of the gospel commission. God's last-day prophet to the remnant wrote in words too plain to be misunderstood, "A revival of true godliness among us is the greatest and most urgent of all our needs. To seek this should be our first work" (Selected Messages, book

If a genuine spiritual revival is the greatest and most urgent of all our needs, should we not place priority on seeking Heaven's promised blessing with all our hearts? Jackson continues, "As president of the North American Division, I want to appeal to each layperson and to every employee to take this matter personally and seriously. This kind of commitment alone will move the church into the

kind of future that God has in mind for our division."

During the 2010 North American Division Year End Meeting, Dan Jackson, NAD president, challenged every member of the church to seek genuine spiritual revival.

Prior to the 2010 Year-end Meeting, the NAD leadership team met in an exercise of strategic planning for the next five years. "We resolve that by 2015, the church in North America will have become transformed by the Holy Spirit and moved to action in the following five ways," says Jackson.

Boonstra Passes Baton to Bradshaw

It Is Written Welcomes New Speaker/Director

On December I, 2010, Shawn Boonstra, speaker/director of *It Is Written* television ministry, announced that he would no longer be serving in his present capacity due to health issues. The It Is Written board voted to place Boonstra on a sabbatical leave so that he can adequately recover.





"Shawn Boonstra has made great strides and has led *It Is Written* to new heights in media communication and remarkable soul-winning efforts in some of the most challenging places on earth," stated Dan Jackson, NAD president and *It Is Written* board chairman. Jackson continues, "However, the Lord never closes a door, without opening another one for us to walk through."

On January 1, Pastor John Bradshaw became the fourth speaker/director of the international *It Is Written* ministry. He follows in the footsteps of ministry founder George Vandeman, along with Mark Finley and Shawn Boonstra.

Bradshaw's experience makes him uniquely suited for the role of speaker/director. Said Boonstra, "Our backgrounds and approaches to the work are remarkably similar, and yet he brings new insights and abilities that will expand *It Is Written*'s impact and help the ministry become even more effective in leading people to Christ."

Bradshaw's broadcasting career began in his home country of New Zealand, where he worked as a disc jockey on a number of the nation's top radio stations. He left this job in 1990—propelled by a desire to find Bible-based truth and a deeper Chris-

tian experience. After receiving a copy of *The Great Controversy*, he knew he'd found something special. Six months later he was baptized into the Seventh-day Adventist Church.

He met his soon-to-be-wife, Melissa, at church, and soon after their wedding,

he began working as an evangelist for Amazing Facts. After 12 years, the family—which now included son Jacob and daughter Shannon—decided to put down roots. In the years that followed, Bradshaw served as pastor of the Lexington, Kentucky, Seventh-day Adventist Church, as well as

the Village Church near Walla Walla University in Washington.

During his 15 years of pastoral minis-

try, Bradshaw has held more than 80 evangelistic series. For him, nothing matches the joy of introducing others to Christ.

"In my experience, *It Is Written* has always stood for evangelism," said Bradshaw. "When the presence of Christ floods into a person's life, the impossible becomes possible. The chains are broken. The old is made new. I love that *It Is Written* communicates this around the world on a daily basis."

Bradshaw feels humbled to be following in Boonstra's footsteps and appreciates his Christ-centered leadership and the ways in which the Lord has used the Boonstra family to make a worldwide impact for Christ.

"It Is Written is already doing the work that God has asked it to do, and I can't wait to do my part in continuing its mission," said Bradshaw. "I believe the Lord has plans for this ministry that we can't yet comprehend!"




Neal Wilson Dies

Until his appointment, Pollard was one of three final candidates for the presidential seat, vacated in July when former president Delbert W. Baker, Ph.D., resigned the position to serve as one of nine general vice presidents of the Seventh-day Adventist Church. Pollard assumes his new position as the 13th president of Oakwood University on January 3, 2011.

The two other finalists were Gina Spivey Brown, Ph.D., and Bertram L. Melbourne, Ph.D. Brown, the only female finalist, serves as Dean of the School of

Health Professions, Science, and Wellness at Washington Adventist University. Melbourne is Professor of **Biblical** Language and Literature Howard University School of Divinity.

Pollard's commitment to excellence is seen in his drive for education. He earned a B.A. degree from Oakwood University and an M.Div. degree from the SDA Theological Seminary at Andrews University. He earned the D.Min. degree in Preaching and Worship from Claremont School of Theology. Seeking higher-level fiscal and administrative development, Pollard earned an M.B.A. degree in Organizational Management from the La Sierra University School of Business. To culminate his academic pursuits, he graduated from Andrews University with the Ph.D. degree in New Testament Language and Literature, with specialization in apocalyptic literature.

Pollard's 32 years of leadership reflect local, national, and international service. He has served as senior pastor,

a youth pastor, a university chaplain, a health-care program administrator, and an educational administrator at LLU. As a clergyman, Pollard has functioned as an evangelist, professor, ministerial educator, and leadership development facilitator to the General Conference family. He regularly leads denominational and nondenominational leadership and mission conferences all over the world.

Pollard's orientation to fiscal leadership emerges from his experience as senior pastor of major congregations, from administering university budgets and grants, and from his graduate business education. Pollard views chief-exec-



As I embrace technology and look for ways to use it as a light shining in the darkness, I don't want to get sucked into the darkness myself. I want to learn to be still. I want the same for you.



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
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
