### **Teacher Legacy Award** JOHN REICHERT '87-'14

Anotive of Berrien County, John was born in St. Joseph, Michigan. His love for athletics was evident as a student attending Andrews Academy. He graduated in 1982, receiving the senior class Most Athletic award and the Thomas Andrew Umek Memorial Acumen Award for his integrity, inspiration, and involvement in the Academy's intramural program. He went on to attend Andrews University, where he majored in physical education, was a three-year member of the AU Gymnics team, and completed his student teaching practicum at Andrews Academy under the direction of Lydia Chong. After graduating with his bachelor's degree in 1986, he moved with his wife Ann-Marie (Riches) to California to teach. He then received a call from Andrews Academy to return to Michigan and become a physical education instructor. He accepted the call and was hired under the leadership of Dr. Richard T. Orrison and worked alongside his close friend Lydia Chong.

From 1987-2014, John served as a member of the faculty at Andrews Academy and helped to cultivate the physical education program in innumerable ways. He taught classes that encompassed a wide variety of sports. Roller hockey, volleyball, and badminton were a few of his favorites. He also

directed the school's outdoor education trips. Along with Alan Anderson, he planned week-long experiences in backpacking, road cycling, mountain biking, and canoeing. He directed a thriving and competitive intramural program, as well as helped to create the Andrews Academy Fitness Center. The fitness center overlooked the gymnasium from the balcony level, and included a rock-climbing wall, an interactive sports-themed video game system, weight machines, and treadmills. This center was a haven for fitness-minded students.

John's fondest memories of his time at Andrews Academy are centered around his former pupils and peers. He was a sponsor of seven different classes: 1991, 1995, 1999, 2003, 2007, 2011, and 2015. He challenged and encouraged students to try new things, step outside of their comfort zones, and always do their best. He highlighted sportsmanship above all, including an attitude that sports can be more than just a game when they are used to instill healthy habits within us. During his time at the Academy, he also had the opportunity to teach his son, Nic, as well as five of his nieces and nephews–Zach and Ashley Reichert, and Guy, Sarah, and Bethany Puffer. John was privileged to have worked with many amazing staff members. He considers them to be not only professional peers, but dear friends.

During his time at Andrews Academy, John always endeavored to extend a listening ear, a calm demeanor, and a caring spirit to everyone in the classroom, on the field, and in the community. He strove to be an encouragement to others, and to build up and help those around him. He always cheered for the underdog and celebrated the accomplishments and successes of others. His influence even reached outside of the walls of the Academy, as he hosted volleyball nights for the community and brought people together under the spirit of fellowship.

John continues to live in Berrien Springs, Michigan, with his wife Ann-Marie. He enjoys building projects, and taking motorcycle trips with family, traveling, and visiting their son Nic, who is a high school teacher and volleyball and basketball coach in Arizona.

John Reichert is currently a deputy with the Berrien County Sherriff's Department. Working in the county since 2015, his outstanding work and respect from his peers and supervisors led him to be named Berrien County Deputy of the Year in 2020. In his current work, he carries with him the same philosophies and mindsets as he did during his time at Andrews Academy, and the ministry he built is one of kindness, respect, and empathy. Next year, he plans to retire from Berrien County after ten years, having also worked in Adventist education as a teacher for more than twenty-seven years.

### **Alumni of the Year** Marjorie (McClure) & John Eggers '59



John Eggers, born in Houston, Texas, and Marjorie (Marge) McClure, born in Somerset West, South Africa, were brought together in 1958 in Berrien Springs, Michigan, as students at EMCA (now Andrews Academy). John's initial attempt to connect with Marjorie was walking behind her as they were leaving the melon feed in the grove, the first activity of the school year. "If you wait up for me, I will walk with you," was all she needed to hear. The sympathy that Marge shared when John broke his arm at an Academy vs college football game welded them together. They have been walking together now for 65 years—not just walking but running, riding, flying, and enjoying life as husband and wife and

later as father and mother of two children, John II and Jannelle.

Marjorie finished a BA in education in 1964 as she had promised her father, Academic Dean at EMC (now Andrews University), and immediately put it to work teaching at Berrien Springs Elementary School and then at Collegedale Academy in Tennessee. John supported the family in a construction company that he formed, working full time, and going to college part-time for seven years. Because he didn't want to take another seven years to finish school, the family moved to Southern Missionary College where he finished his BA in history with a religion minor in two years.

Their places of employment brought them teaching and administrative positions as well as parenting opportunities across the US in dormitories at Monterey Bay Academy and Forest Lake Academy, and then around the world to Far Eastern Academy in Singapore. Encounters with "their" students throughout the years continue to bring many hugs and slaps on the back with much laughter as memories are resurrected. Construction beckoned John to full-time work, and in 1986, he and Marge moved to Paradise, California. John's time became fully committed to building more than 140 homes in that Northern California area with Marge working as project manager.

Paradise provided an opportunity for John and Marge to further their desire to share their love for God with the business associates and the many friends they enjoyed fellowshipping with there. Their children had settled in that area, which made it very convenient to see their son, John, and wife Terri, and their two children where John moved into a practice as an OB/ GYN. Their daughter, Jannelle, and husband, Larry Gooch, established Magnetech Engineering Services, and with their two children were close by. John and Marge claim their last move has been made to Cleveland, Tennessee, near Southern Adventist University, where John continues to do construction projects, while Marge enjoys feeding and entertaining friends and making more friends at Collegedale Community Church, where they have become members. Texas and South Africa have joined two people together to share their love for the Lord and His soon return.

### **Convocation Speaker** JOEL BENNETT '99

Joel Bennett remembers experiencing the closeness of the Spirit for the first time while attending Andrews Academy and participating in prayer groups with Jim Moon. This experience was what Joel believed separated this education from so many other good options. These prayer groups focused on praising the Lord for His attributes, which was a deeply transformative focus. In many regards, the experience of dwelling in the presence of the Lord has shaped the trajectory of his life.



The longing to dwell in the throne room of the Lord is so powerful that he has invited many students and friends to experience the same joy.

He is a proud husband and father of two. His daughter is a freshman in college this year, and his son is a sophomore in high school. He graduated with a degree in Elementary Education and a Masters of Education in Instructional Design. Over the past twenty-one years, he has taught for Seventh-day Adventist elementary schools and homeschooled in Texas, Indiana, Michigan, Washington, and Georgia. While serving as a teaching principal in Washington, he helped instill a student culture of respect, encouragement, and cooperation. Once there was a spirit of trust and cooperation, the school experimented with placed based learning and other nature integration.

Joel and his wife live on a farm in Southwest Michigan with two large dogs, 33 hens, two roosters, three therapy horses, and five farm cats. They enjoy baking sourdough bread, making fresh pasta, and fresh corn tortillas. They find joy in leaf mulch gardening and harvesting local produce. Their family motto is *To Serve the Lord Willingly*. The Lord has proven again and again that He is enough.

### **Alumnus of the Year Criteria**

An alumnus (graduate or attendee of EMCA/AUA/AA) is selected each year to be honored at alumni weekend as Alumnus of the Year. A candidate for this award may be nominated by any Andrews Academy alumnus, current faculty member, or former faculty member, but all nominees should be in an honor class. Often a member of the fifty-year class is recognized.

#### Award Criteria

The nominee's life must demonstrate the philosophy and vision of the school. The philosophy is best described by the quote on the theme wall: "To restore in man the image of the Maker is the object of education." The vision statement of the school is, "As a Seventh-day Adventist secondary school, Andrews Academy seeks to inspire its students to think deeply, live fully, serve unselfishly, and honor God completely"—which has been expanded upon for the purpose of this award. To be considered for this award, a candidate must exemplify the criteria below:

- To Think Deeply: The individual has achieved success in his or her profession.
- To Live Fully: The individual has lived a life filled with meaning and balance.
- To Serve Unselfishly: The individual has modeled outstanding service to society and/or the church.
- To Honor God Completely: The individual exemplifies Jesus in his or her daily life.

The Alumni Advisory Council recognizes that evidence of successful personal application of the philosophy in one's relationship to God is impossible to truly ascertain. However, evidences of outstanding contributions to one's environment, family, church, community, or workplace can be more readily assessed and will be considered. In keeping with Christ's story of the widow and the mite, it will be remembered that at times one who lives a quiet and steadfast life may be the most worthy recipient of this award.

#### **Nomination Process**

All nominations must be submitted in writing to the Andrews Academy Alumni Coordinator. Nominations will be received for the following year starting the Monday after alumni and will close on June 1. Anyone may nominate a classmate from an honored class by answering the questions below and providing the information requested. The nominees may be contacted by the Alumni Coordinator for further information and clarification. Selection of the award recipients will be determined by the Alumni Advisory Council by mid-summer. This council consists of the alumni coordinator, principal, a faculty member, and representatives of the honored classes.

#### **Annual Fund**

Each year approximately 20% of the students enrolled receive tuition assistance from the Worthy Student Fund. Without the gifts regularly made by alumni and friends, these tuition supplements would not be possible.

#### **Gifts-In-Kind**

Significant contributions to school operations may be made through gifts-in-kind, which carry tax benefits. These are material gifts of value, such as antiques, collections, equipment, vehicles, and real property that can enrich the curricular or co-curricular programs.

#### **Planned Giving**

This giving opportunity provides donors with an opportunity to give that integrates sound personal, financial, and estate-planning concepts with plans for lifetime or testamentary giving. A planned gift has tax implications and is often transmitted through a legal document, such as a will or a trust.

#### **Special Projects**

### **Project Chapel - Phase 2**

During Phase 1 of our chapel renovation, we put in new, higher quality video wiring in the projection system, and in the chapel ceiling, two TV monitors that are used by the song leaders. We also put in a new audio system and LED lighting in the chapel. A new feature wall that hides the "backstage" was also included for programming feature purposes. The backstage door opens up to C Wing. Two large TV screens were added on each side for projection purposes.
